

## BRITISH SUBJECTS OWNING PROPERTY

Real Estate and Securities in  
Enemy Countries Can Be  
Claimed.

UNDER PUBLIC TRUSTEE  
Applications Should Be Made  
at Once to Insure Any  
Protection.

Do you own property, or have you  
creditors in Germany, Austria or Tur-  
key? If so, the following information  
received officially from the British  
Government that the public trustee  
will be of interest:

It has been arranged by the British  
Government that the public trustee  
shall keep a record of:

(a) Debts (including bank balances)  
owed by British subjects to persons  
residing in enemy countries;  
(b) Other property in enemy coun-  
tries (including securities belonging to  
British subjects).

Any person desiring to record such  
claims or property can obtain the nec-  
essary form for that purpose (Form  
No. 1 in the first case and Form No. 2  
in the second) from the public trustee.  
Applications should be made to the  
public trustee (trading with the enemy  
department), No. 2 Clement's Inn,  
Strand, W.C.

It must be clearly understood that  
the action of the public trustee will be  
confined to entering upon the record  
claims of which particulars are sup-  
plied to him, and that in no way com-  
pulsory on the British Government either  
to take any action on the basis of the  
claims entered or to taking any  
action on the conclusion of hostilities  
or otherwise for the recovery of the  
debts or property in question.

The public trustee will record claims  
against enemy governments in respect  
of public securities of those govern-  
ments held by the claimants, but other  
claims against enemy governments (e.g.,  
in respect of goods or property ac-  
quisition or sequestration) as distinct  
from claims against enemy subjects,  
should be notified to the Director of  
the Foreign Claims Office, Foreign Of-  
fice, S. W.

## STEEL AND RADIATION WORKING FULL CAPACITY

The plant of the Steel & Radiation  
is operating steadily at full capacity,  
according to official information  
given to the Financial News Bureau,  
and the output of shells is between  
900 and 1000 shells a day. The com-  
pany has now been shipping shrapnel  
for six weeks. The output at the pres-  
ent time is two carloads a week, 2100  
shells a car, and the officials expect  
that the third carload a week will be  
added very shortly. The company's  
plant is now completed and has  
been put into the manufacture  
of shells as well.

The company employs its own ex-  
perienced engineers for shop manage-  
ment and inspection. The result of this  
move is that shop loss in shell manu-  
facture has been kept down to .0085  
per cent, and the output of shells is  
the satisfactory position of having the  
full 100 per cent of its shell ship-  
ment passed by the government in-  
spectors for tensile and firing strength.

The portions of the plant not now  
devoted entirely to the manufacture  
of shells are being used to produce full  
capacity, turning out expanded metal  
and steel sheets. The boiler and radi-  
ation plant at St. Catharines is also kept  
busy on full time and shift work.

den activity in the general mining  
market will cause sudden advances.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-  
WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male  
over eighteen years of age, who has been  
residing in Canada for at least six months  
and in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Al-  
berta, and who has been a resident of the  
Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-  
Agency for the District. Entry by proxy  
may be made at any Dominion Land  
Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain  
conditions.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and  
cultivation of the land in each of three  
years. A homesteader may live within  
the boundaries of the land in each of three  
years, or at least eight acres, on certain  
conditions. A habitable house is required,  
except where the land is situated in the  
vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in  
standing may be granted a quarter sec-  
tion alongside his homestead. Price,  
\$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months' residence in each  
of three years after earning homestead  
patent; also fifty acres extra cultivation.  
Pre-emption patent may be obtained as  
soon as homestead patent, on certain  
conditions.

Persons who have exhausted his homestead  
right may take a purchased homestead  
patent in certain tracts. Price, \$3.00 per  
acre. Duties—Must reside six months  
in each of the three years, cultivate fifty  
acres and erect a house worth \$100.
