BRUGES BOMBARDED BY ALLIED AVIATORS

Gas Woorks Reported Damaged by Message From Sluis, Holland, Across Way.

AMSTERDAM, Sept. 27, via London.—Airmen of the entente allies have again bombarded Bruges, Belgium. The sudden cessation of the flow of gas at Sluis (in Zeeland, on the Belgian frontier), which is supplied from Bruges, leads to the suspicion here that bombs from the air craft struck the gas works.

A message received later from Bruges confirmed the belief that the gas works had been struck by the bombs of the allied airmen. The whole city has been thrown into darkness, the despatch said.

MONTREAL, Sep. 27.—Robertson Macaulay, 83, known as the "father of life insurance in Canada," died at his home, Dorchester street, this afternoon.

Mr. Macaulay was seized with pneumonia early last week, and gradually weekened.

He was born at Fraserburgh, Aberdeen, Scotland, January, 1833. He came to Canada in 1854. For 16 years he was accountant to the Canada Life Assurance Company, and then secretary of the Mutuel Life Assurance Company at Hamilton, Ont. He became secretary of the Sun Life Assurance Company in Montreal in 1874, manager in 1876, managing director in 1887, and president in 1889. He was succeeded as manager by his son, T. B. Macaulay.
