give for our supplies in our needy state. We are under obligations to praise God, for disposing the hearts of so many to so great charity; and under great bonds to pray for a blessing on the heads, hearts and families of them who so liberally and plentifully gave for our relief. It is certain, that the charity of the whole country of Canada, though moved with the doctrine of merit, does not come up to the charity of Boston alone, where notions of merit are rejected; but acts of charity, performed out of a right Christian spirit, from a spirit of thankfulness to God, out of obedience to God's command, and unfeigned love and charity to them that are of the same family and houshold of faith. The Lord grant, that all who devise such liberal things, may find the accomplishment of the promises made by God in their own persons and theirs after them, from generation to generation.

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
