Leave out the ample means that lie in the hands of Christian people—means in money and in agen's—to carry out the Lord's command and to fulfil the essential mission of the Church. Leave out all those fundamental principles that lie as the basis of all missionary work. And, in thinking of our Canadian missionary field, leave out nine-tenths of that. You are to imagine
