ARCHANGEL GOVERNMENT FOR RUSSIAN ASSEMBLY

Washington, Sept. 25.—A hopeful sign from Russia came today in news reaching the state department that the government of the north at Archangel had notified the pan-Russian conference now in session at Ufa of its acceptance of the plan to set up anew the constituent assembly as the general governing authority.
Through this conference officials here believe a long step may be taken towards solving the internal troubles for Russia. The Bolsheviks are excluded from the gathering, which is attended and supported by many members of the regularly elected assembly overturned by the Bolshevik movement.
Word of the acceptance of the plan by the Archangel government, which had already consolidated with that at Samara, was sent to Samara by courier and thence to Ufa from Archangel. It also is reported that the Siberian

UNIFORM PRICE THRUOUT CANADA

Vancouver Shipbuilders Complain They Cannot Compete With Eastern Yards.
Ottawa, Sept. 25.—Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, minister of marine, when interviewed regarding government orders placed with the British Columbia shipbuilders for steel ships, stated that it was not a fact that steel ships similar in size, are being built in Seattle at a higher cost than at Vancouver, and that, as a matter of fact, the United States Government is getting steel ships somewhat similar in size and equipment at a lower finished cost than the Canadian Government is getting from the B. C. steel shipbuilders.
Mr. Ballantyne further stated that the object of the delegation that waited upon him—shipbuilders from Vancouver—was to place before himself the fact that they were not able to build ships out there in competition with eastern Canada, and to press the minister to take British Columbia conditions into his favorable consideration and grant a higher price for government ships being built at Vancouver than is being paid in eastern Canada.
The minister said that so far he has been placing orders for government standard steel ships at a uniform price thruout all the steel shipbuilding yards in Canada, and this policy the British Columbia shipbuilders object to, alleging that they cannot compete with eastern Canada yards. The minister is giving the matter his consideration and it will be decided within a few days whether the government will grant British Columbia shipbuilders a higher price for steel ships than is being paid in eastern yards.
The minister was emphatic in his declaration that having taken the necessary action to accurately inform himself, he was in a position to state positively that the prices he was offering to shipbuilders in British Columbia were not lower than those obtaining on the United States Pacific coast.
