UNFILED ORDERS OF U. S. STEEL INCREASED

The U. S. Steel Corporation on June 30 were 4,822,855 tons, according to the corporation's monthly statement issued today. This is an increase of 10,545 tons compared with the orders of May 31. On April 30, 1919, the filled tonnage was 4,800,685, and on June 30 of the same year it was 8,918,866 tons.

The statement, it was said, showed a turn in the tide of the steel industry, marking the first increase in unfilled tonnage since October, 1918.

Until now there had been a steady decrease in the amount of unfilled orders.

BANK OF ENGLAND.

London, July 10.—The weekly statement of the Bank of England shows the following changes:

Total reserve, increased £455,000; circulation, decreased £232,000; bullion, increased £102,582; other securities, decreased £158,000; public deposits, increased £237,000; notes in circulation, increased £424,000; other deposits, increased £38,291,000; government securities, decreased £28,249,600.

The proportion of the bank's reserve to liability this week is 12.30 per cent; last week it was 12.12 per cent.

BANK OF GERMANY STATEMENT.

Berlin, via London, July 10.—The statement of the Imperial Bank of Germany for the week ending June 30, shows the following changes:

Total coin and bullion, decreased 1,151,000 marks; gold, decreased 1,385,000 marks; silver, decreased 297,000 marks; notes of other banks, increased 4,947,000 marks; investments, decreased 14,865,000 marks; other securities, increased 11,481,000 marks; non-circulation, increased 8,602,234 marks; deposits, increased 1,408,369 marks.

Total gold holdings, 1,115,500 marks.

HYLAN SAVES CURB BROKERS.

New York, July 10.—A measure designed to curb irregular stock transactions by requiring curb brokers to obtain licenses from the city, recently passed unanimously by the board of aldermen today was vetoed by Mayor Hylan. Despite an amendment prohibiting the unlicensed brokers "in the streets of New York," the mayor insisted the proposed ordinance would prove non-effective, for the reason that brokers "could move to another block."

GOVERNMENT IS SPEEDING UP

WAGON ROAD TO SHINING TREE

Engineer Whitson Promises Road Will Be Ready for Freight Transportation to Wasipika Within Ten Days

--Rush of Prospectors Reminiscent of Cobak's Early Days.

Ontario government good roads engineer, J. F. Whitson, is doing great work on the West Shining Tree wagon road into the new gold camp 24 miles away from the National Railway at West Tree, Engineer Whitson has two gangs of men and teams on the road, comprising in all about 100 men and 14 teams. There are about 60 men and seven teams on the road and nearest the railway. This part of the road is graded for nine miles and ready for heavy traffic. There is another gang of about 45 men and teams working on the last eight miles of the road. Mr. Whitson promised Mr. Fitzgerald, the diamond drill outfit, that the road would be finished so they could get thru with 18 to 20 hundred pounds of freight all the way to Wasipika within ten days. Mr. Whitson has made a name for himself among the settlers of New Ontario by building "Whitson roads" thru the agricultural belt of Ontario, thus making it possible for the farmer to get his produce to market more easily.

Mr. Whitson recently visited the gold camp at Wasipika and West Shining Tree and was amazed at the progress the camp had made; also at the amount of freight and machinery waiting to go over the road when finished. He became seized of the great possibilities of the camp, and immediately gave orders to double the number of men and teams so as to finish the road at the earliest possible date. It is expected the road will be ready for heavy traffic all the way to Wasipika by July 30.

Camp Supplies Wait.

At present there is a car load of camp supplies comprising three diamond drill outfits, two pieces of equipment waiting at West Tree for the road to be finished. This outfit is for Mr. Fitzgerald, who has a contract to diamond drill 10,000 feet on the Atlas and Herriot properties. The West Tree Company and Gold Corona Company are also figuring on doing some diamond drilling. The road is expected to be finished by July 30.

C. T. Hershman, engineer in charge of the Atlas, has a three-ton motor truck on the way for use in freight. The new graded road will be a camp within two and a half to three hours of the railway.

Prospectors are pouring into the country at the rate of thirty to forty per day. Some of the boys who came

out this morning met 17 canoes on the way into the camp yesterday.

Shining Tree Lake is north to Wasipika has recently been swept by a very severe bush fire. Everything is burnt clean. The fire was partly quenched by heavy rain. Days of very heavy rain last Tuesday and Wednesday, July 1 and 2. Immediately after the fire several important finds were made. In one instance an extension of the famous Gosselin vein was picked up on the second or third claim north of the original Gosselin. These claims were staked recently. They were covered with a heavy slant of fallen timber and underbrush and the ground was hidden and low lying. The dry weather and fire cleaned off the slant, and after the rain the lead lay exposed. It is from 20 to 42 feet wide, and carries good gold values. Billy Grant has made an other good discovery since the fire and one may look for dozens of more finds, now that the dies are over and the fire has burnt off the slash.

There is some talk of four or five of the big mining companies getting into the gold camp at Wasipika for a railway from Elk Lake to the National Railway at or near West Tree. This road would open up Gosselin and pass thru the heart of West Shining Tree gold camp, about half of this distance all that would have to be done would be to cut down the jack-pine trees, hew them into fire rails, lay the road, and grading the track after, for the surface is a level, jack-pine plain for miles at a time.

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
