## IMPORTANT CANCER DISCOVERY.

Question of Heredity May Soon Be Solved.

There is a happy possibility of the mystery of the terrible disease of cancer being solved at no very remote date. This was hinted at yesterday when the results of the annual meeting of the year by the Imperial Cancer Research Fund were described at the annual meeting of the fund's laboratory. He dealt chiefly with the results of the inoculation of 100,000 mice, and are now able to reproduce at will in mice all the features of spontaneous cancer, and to protect healthy mice from all the consequences of inoculating them with the cancerous virus. This having been achieved, it is not too much to hope that the further development of the experimental study of cancer will yield results having a direct bearing on the nature and treatment of the disease," added Dr. Bashford.

After repeated failures during 30 years, the fund have been able to obtain offspring from mice suffering naturally from the disease, and in the near future it may be concluded that the cause of cancer in man is of the same nature as in mice. Sixty per cent. of the "spontaneous" cancers which Dr. Bashford referred to had been got to grow in mice previously to the point of the experimental study of cancer. This conclusion is a most important one, and the results are of the greatest importance.

"Protection" experiments were so successful that whereas in ordinary mice developed tumors after inoculation, none of the protected animals developed the disease.

At the same time Dr. Bashford added a note of warning, namely, the results might give rise to exaggerated expectations. He said it was not yet possible, he said, to arrest the progress of cancerous tumors, much less to effect the cure of this disease.

Unlike her peripatetic line of effort she manages to convey by word and gesture a whole story of her life, and a wealth of detail that gives at once a clear insight into the characteristics of her subject. This will be the last opportunity to see Mr. Chevalier, as he intends to confine his talents to the dramatic stage in the future. He makes his first appearance in London in January next.

Two Roofed Lakes. A roofed lake exists in Siberia, near Obdorsk. This lake is nine miles wide and seventeen miles long. Its roof, a natural one, is made of salt.

Geologists say that, long ago, a great part of the water of the lake of Obdorsk must have suddenly evaporated, leaving huge salt crystals floating on the surface. These crystals in time caked together. Thus the water was covered over with them as they trod.

The lake, in 1878, dropped three feet; it found an underground outlet into the Ob River. But the salt crust was so thick upon it that it retained its level. Not dropping at all, it formed a roof of salt, three feet high over the whole body of water.

On the Mangishlaik Peninsula, in the Caspian Sea, there is another lake that has a roof of salt crystals thick and strong enough to allow men and horses to cross it on foot.
