Palma Gals Off Army

TO AVERT U. S. INTERVENTION WILL TREAT FOR PEACE

Decree Suspending Operations Issued in Havana and Embassies Sent to the Provinces to Confer With the Revolutionists.

Havana, Sept. 15.—The government this evening is making strenuous efforts to restore peace in Cuba, and thus avert any kind of American intervention.

The object of these endeavors, it is stated, is that it may be able to say by the time Secretary to War Taft arrives that peace already has been secured, and therefore there is no need for the American government's intervention either to restore peace or insure permanent tranquility.

Members of the government informed the Associated Press that they are making the efforts in accordance with the advice contained in President Roosevelt's letter, that they have no objection to the friendly assistance of the United States in the matter if it becomes necessary, but that they believe they can settle between the government and the revolutionists without the necessity of any intervention.

After the decree was issued government emissaries were despatched in automobiles to confer with the revolutionists. Gen. Antonio Maceo was accompanied by Congressman Gobin and Garcia Vela, the youngest son of Calixto Garcia, drove in the direction where Antonio Maceo was encamped, with Santiago de las Vegas, and others went to Guantánamo, which places this afternoon was occupied by a big band of revolutionists under Congressman Campos Marqueti.

Gen. Freyre Andrade, when asked about the terms discussed at the conference with the revolutionists, said that the conferees only touched upon terms informally, and that the only thing was certain, the government would never agree to annul the constitutional election, and that conferees were eliminated from the claims of the revolutionists.

Simultaneously with the issuance of the decree declared a cessation of hostilities, the special judge in charge of the cases against the alleged conspirators in prison and prisoners recently captured, liberated 32 of the latter, against whom indictments had been issued.

Henry Carscadden Dead Sleeps Peacefully Away. Conservative Member for East Hamilton in Legislature Victim of Bright's Disease.

Hamilton, Sept. 16.—(Special.)—Henry Carscadden, M.P., the gifted representative of East Hamilton, and chairman of the private bills committee in the Ontario legislature, died about 5.30 this evening.

His end was very peaceful. He had been unconscious since Thursday, and just slept away. Bright's Disease was the cause of his death, and of late he had not suffered greatly, although his family think that his condition was aggravated by the startling announcement made a few weeks ago by his doctor that he had the disease in an advanced stage.

EX-DEPUTY CHIEF STUART PERHAPS FATALLY HURT

Falls From Street Car and Receives Severe Concussion of Brain. His many friends, and they can be counted by hundreds, will regret to learn that ex-Deputy Chief of Police Stuart is laid up at his residence, 130 Wilton-avenue, from the result of an accident which may prove fatal.

Saturday night Mr. Stuart was on his way to pay his daily visit to his old-time comrade, Inspector Hall, who has been ill for a year.

Inspector Hall lives on Classic-avenue. Mr. Stuart was on a belt-line car. Whether the car passed Classic-avenue, his head was badly out. He was taken home in an auto and walked upstairs, but then fell unconscious, and at early hour this morning he was in the same condition. He is suffering from concussion of the brain.

Seven Probably Cremated Missing Since Ottawa Fire. Miss Loveday, Secretary Bernardo Home at Peterboro, Supposed to Have Been in Gilmour Hotel Friday Night—No Human Remains Have Been Located.

Winnipeg, Man., Sept. 16.—(Special.)—Over three thousand men belonging to the building trades unions of Winnipeg go on strike to-day. Owing to the action of the trustees of the unions, in refusing to arbitrate with the journeymen plumbers, the strike has been declared, and all building operations will be tied up.

On Saturday night bricklayers and masons decided to strike, while carpenters have already declared for a strike. A big mass meeting of the labor union of the city was held at the Bijou Theatre this afternoon, when the strike was authorized.

There are hundreds of buildings in the city partly built, which the contractors were rushing to get done before the winter came on.
