AMERICANS SUFFERED TREMENDOUS LOSS.

General Linares Concentrating His Forces Towards the De-
fensive Works—Shafter's Force in Jeopardy.

London, July 3.—The Madrid correspond-
ent of The Observer says: "The last of-
ficial news from Cuba is to the effect that
the Americans suffered an enormous loss in
the attack on El Caney and Aguadores.
Gen. Linares is concentrating his troops to-
ward the defensive works around the town,
where he hopes to overthrow the American
forces. Meanwhile the Spaniards from
Guantanamo effected a meeting at Altatogo
with the reinforcements from Holguin,
making 8000 men who are now marching
to fall upon the Americans' right flank,
and they can give Gen. Shafter much trou-
ble."

GEN. LINARES WOUNDED.
And Half the Spaniards Engaged
Were Fined Hors de Combat.
Madrid, July 3, 10 a.m.—Capt-General
Blanco reports to the Government, under
date of July 1, as follows: "At noon to-
day the enemy vigorously attacked San-
tiago, and succeeded in taking the advanced
positions of Lomas and San Juan, after
a vehement resistance, lasting three hours,
on our part. We were able to save our
artillery, though half the troops were pla-
ced hors de combat. Gen. Linares was se-
verely wounded in the left arm, and re-
linquished his command to Gen. Torralba.
The enemy in considerable force attacked
the village of El Caney this morning, but
was repulsed by Gen. Vara. The fight was
renewed this evening and ended in El Caney
itself being captured after a vigorous re-
sistance on our part."

ANOTHER BLOODY BATTLE.
Spadiards at El Caney Hemmed in
on All Sides—American
Loss About 1500.
Headquarters of General Shafter, Friday,
July 1, evening, by the Associated Press
despatch boat Cynthia, via Port Antonio,
Saturday, and Kingston, Sunday, July 3,
2.30 a.m.—Hemmed in on all sides by Gen.
Lawton's division, the Spanish troops in
the town of Caney are to-night practically
prisoners of war, and by daybreak to-mor-
row, Saturday, Spain will have lost 2000
of her best soldiers, wounded and taken
prisoners in and around the town, which
was practically in the hands of the Amer-
ican forces at 5 o'clock to-night. This
result was not obtained, however, without
severe fighting on the part of the Ameri-
can forces, and, although it is impossible
at the time to give a list of dead and
wounded, it is safe to say that the loss in
General Lawton's division alone will be
1000 killed and wounded.
