## THE CASE OF H. A. COSTIGAN

As Presented by the Conservative  
Minority to the Public Accounts  
Committee

WHEN ADOPTION WAS REFUSED.

Appointment at Winnipeg Alleged  
to Have Been Made Solely  
for Politics.

Ottawa, Aug. 8.—(Special.)—The Public

MAN-OF-WAR SANK A SHIP.
