**A RATHER GLOOMY PROSPECT.**

Thousands of People Up North Who Will Have No Fuel or Shelter and There is Suffering Ahead.

Washington, Sept. 20.—The following despatch has been received from Major F. H. Ray, dated Fort St. Michael, August 31: "I and at Anvil and along the beach between 300 and 3500 people. Only 2500 of these people will be compelled to leave there before the close of navigation, owing to lack of fuel and shelter. From all I can learn here, there will be but three steamers to return before the season closes. Unless the people can get away there will be great suffering and probably loss of life which will be unable to ameliorate. As a rule, all have plenty of money to pay their passage, and that the Treasury Department companies be warned of the condition of affairs, and that the Treasury Department be asked to order cutters there as late as possible to meet an emergency. The Cape Klondike is one of the richest ever discovered in our country, and will rival the Klondike. The beach washing is a godsend to the destitute stranded here. There are from 800 to 1000 people along the beach, and they are taking out from \$10 to \$25 per day per man. The Gulf district is as yet not fully developed, but shows great richness wherever worked. I look for great results next season."

**ARCH OF WELCOME DESTROYED.**

Builders Banged the Structure and the Two Halves Would Not Join.

Detroit, Sept. 20.—A large arch of welcome, which the Common Council ordered erected on Woodward-avenue, in honor of the I.O.O.F. diamond jubilee, and under which to-day's grand parade was to have been marched, was broken and totally destroyed to-day.

A series of misadventures had pursued the unfinished structure. It was built in two halves, both of which became strained and broken on the attempt to raise them. Last night, when finally gotten up, they would not properly join, and the arch, which appeared on the upper side wall near the front of an adjacent building, caused by the strain of arch raising the building to threaten to fall. To-day a gang of public works employees lowered and destroyed the whole structure in the interest of public safety. The parade managers state that 5000 men were assigned places in this afternoon's parade.

Propositions to make membership in both the parades militant and grand encampment compulsory for representatives to the Sovereign Grand Lodge were defeated in to-day's session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge. A proposition to hold biennial sessions instead of annual was also voted down.

**A STRIKE AT CRAMPS.**

Ship Carpenters Demand a Nine-Hour Day and 27 1/2 Cents an Hour.

Philadelphia, Pa., Sept. 20.—One hundred and fifty ship joiners in Cramps and neighboring yards struck to-day. They had presented demands to the firm asking for a nine-hour day, instead of a ten-hour day at 27 1/2 cents per hour. The Cramps were given an answer having been received at that hour by the joiners, the strike resulted.

**FOUND ANCHOR AND BUOY.**

They Were Marked "Andre, Polar Expedition."

## THE JAMES AUSTIN ESTATE. WOODS DOING PRETTY WELL.

Crown Says Transfers Were Made by the Late Bank President to Save Succession Taxes. HE WILLED LESS THAN \$100,000.

While the Crown Puts in a Plea That the Estate Was Worth Over \$500,000.

The Crown's suit against the estate of the late James Austin, president of the Dominion Bank, for succession duties, is being heard to-day by Mr. Justice Ferguson. The statement of claim setting forth the Crown's side of the case. The Attorney General seeks a reference "to ascertain the extent and value of the estate, the amount payable to succession duties, judgment for the amount so found, with interest and costs."

According to the statement of claim, James Austin died Feb. 27, 1887. His will, of which his son, Albert William Austin, and daughter, Mrs. Arthur, were executor and executrix, was proved in the Probate Court at \$17,800, of which \$8,800 consisted of bank and other stock.

**What He Owed Before.**

Prior to June 17, 1882, however, the decedent, as the law says, Mr. Austin was the owner in his own right of an estate worth \$150,000, consisting of "Spadina property," worth \$150,000; a house at 1000 St. Lawrence Hall property, Toronto, \$80,000; a farm in Lincoln County, \$3000; one in Caledon Township, Peel County, \$4000; another lot of mortgages, \$60,000; shares in the Imperial Bank, \$18,000; in the Canadian Northwest Land Company, \$2000; in the Dominion Telegraph Company, \$2800; in the Dominion Bank, \$150,000; in the North of Scotland Canadian Mortgage Company, \$154,701; and Manitoba assets worth \$154,701, consisting of mortgages, \$64,800; Winnipeg Street Railway Company, \$37,130; and special loans to Winnipeg Street Railway, \$17,512.

**Transfer of His Property.**

The statement of claim then says: "The testator formed the plan or scheme of transferring to the Queen to succeed duties, under the laws of the Province of Ontario, in pursuance of such plan, on June 17, 1882, he purported to convey to R. B. Ostr, M.P., and to H. H. Rogers, of Toronto, trustees, the east half of the 'Spadina property' for a nominal consideration. By an instrument bearing even date therewith, he also purported to assign to them as trustees, mortgages, aggregating \$51,000, and by further instrument of the same date the leasehold of the St. Lawrence Hall property."

**Other Conveyances.**

"By a further instrument, dated June 17, 1882, said James Austin and wife purported to convey to Albert William Austin, one of the defendants, for a nominal consideration, one-half of the 'Spadina property,' together with the farms in Lincoln and Peel Counties. He also purported to assign to Albert William Austin the mortgages aggregating \$51,000, and transferred to him the \$18,000 of Imperial Bank stock, the \$7000 of Canada Northwest Land Company's stock, the \$2000 of Dominion Telegraph Company's stock, and the \$15,700 of the Dominion Bank, together with the \$154,701 of the North of Scotland Canadian Mortgage Company."

**On June 1, 1883, the said James Austin purported also to transfer to Anne Jane Austin, one-half of the value of the Manitoba assets (valued in all at \$154,701).**

The conveyances and transfers were made by James Austin voluntarily and for the purpose of defeating the claim of Her Majesty the Queen to succeed duties under the laws of the Province of Ontario.

The executor and executrix now seek to withdraw the whole of such property from the effect of the said laws in respect of succession duties.

The amount of succession duties payable in respect of the estate of the said James Austin undisturbed of all the time of his death and the properties so conveyed or transferred is now due and payable, but the defendants refuse to pay the same.

The statement of defence has not yet been filed.

**Admiral Bedford in Town.**
