Woman's World... Devoted Especially to the Interests of our Women Readers.

There is no limit to the meanness of some men in money matters, and there is equally no limit to the misery of women who are dependent on such men. Better far better, the men who frankly declare that they don't see why women should be dependent upon them, and who set them to work, than the men who believe in the dependence of women and yet make that dependence a constant humiliation. It is not given to all women to have for fathers or husbands those fine, generous men who believe in a common purse for the household, and who would deem it an insult to their women folk to ask for an account of their disposal of their share of the income. Such men usually get trusted for trust. But one hears queer stories of men who have the reputation of being jolly good fellows, abroad, generous with their money, who pluck their women folk at home, and subject them to the most galling humiliation, because of their dependence. Of such is the father who will not permit his daughters to work for their own living, yet who compels them to come to him for the smallest trifle, a car ticket, a stamp, in order to make them feel that he is head of the household, when an allowance, however small, could be so easily arranged. He is no rare avis this, but a great sustentation of survival of whom most of us have heard and know. He is the sort of being who blusters and roars and bullies the female portion of his household into subjection, who would be very much surprised to be told that he was a tyrant instead of a father, and who would be astonished to learn that there was not a distinguished seat reserved for him among the salutes.

Of a quieter, more gentlemanly class is the man who is mean to his wife where money is concerned. One of such, who is typical of his class, I happen to know, and it grieves me to record that he is a Canadian. He is as mean as he is good-looking, and few there be who know just how mean he is; in fact he is a very prime of meanness to his wife. Since the day she was married, she has never had one cent to spend which she has not been compelled to go to her lord and master for. Most men love to surprise their wives with a little cheque or money gift occasionally. Not so this apology for a man. He makes the purse, and his wife has never enjoyed the luxury of paying a bill, however personal. This man pays the bills, and the proceeds the servant; the very washerwoman has to go to his lordship for her day's wage! TRANSMISSION OF MONEY.

Enormous Growth of the Mail Order Business in Canada by the Postal System.

BANKS AND EXPRESS COMPANIES.

Money Transmitted Safely and Cheaply From Buyer to Seller—Up-to-Date System in Europe.

What is known as "mail order business" is growing by leaps and bounds, and as a consequence the question of cheap transmission of money from place to place is one of deep interest to the community, rich and poor alike, the merchant and his rural customer, the subscriber and publisher, the borrower and lender, the company and the customer. These engaged in the business of transmitting this money are:

The Dominion Postoffice, which sells money orders, and the express companies, which sell drafts for any amount and a kind of money order issued by the banks themselves, associated together for this purpose. The banks also issue drafts for any amount, and the express companies, which sell drafts for any amount, and the express companies, which sell drafts for any amount.

The postal note, being already stamped, is as quickly obtained over the counter as a house stamp. You can send any sum thereby up to \$5, and it costs the purchaser 50c per cent. The money order, 25c by postal order costs 10c, 25c by money order costs 10c. The postal note is cashed in three times as many postoffices as the money order. The note is payable at every post-office, and the money order only at a government accounting office, something like one in every 100 postoffices.

Both postal note and money order are guaranteed by government, but the former only on the condition that the note is a delay of in some cases six months. The postal note is rapidly gaining in favor, and is being paid at the Toronto postoffice at 1000 a day. One difference between the postal note and the money order is that the note is issued in denominations. The money order is made out for the exact sum desired. The postal note is printed, while the money order has to be filled in. Following are the denominations of the postal note and the rates of exchange:

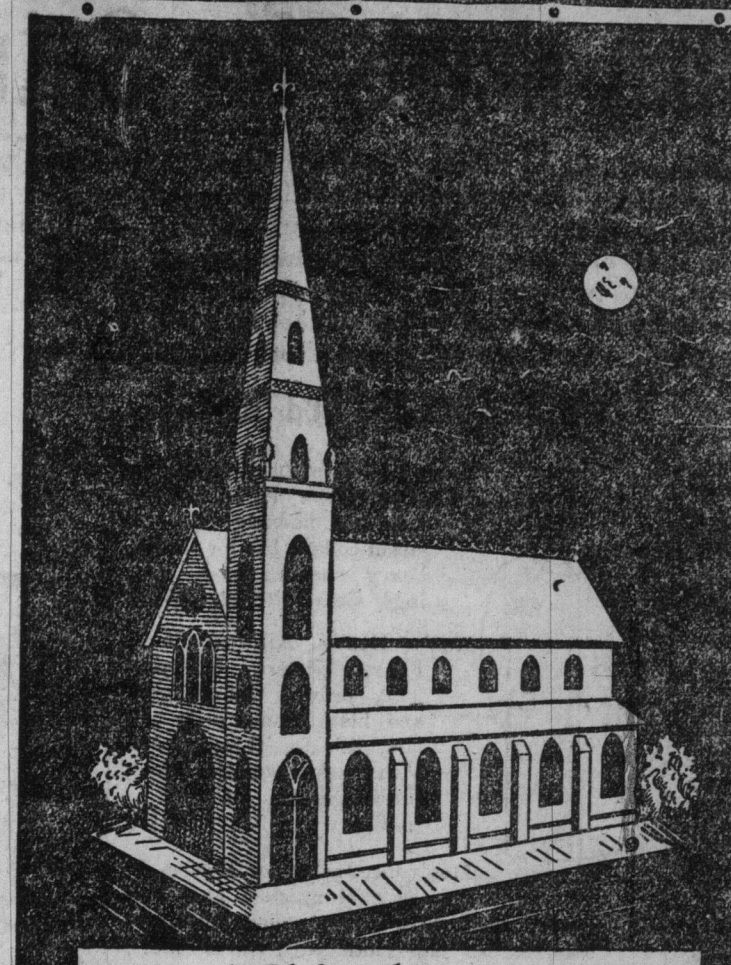
