## CANADIAN FLAG IS BRITISH

And is Entitled to Fly as Such in Any Port of the World by Warrant of the Admiralty.

BRITISH CONSUL AT BAHIA, BRAZIL.

Exceeded His Duty When He Treated the High-handedly.

Ottawa, May 23.—(Special.)—The action of the British Consul in Bahia, Brazil, in ordering the master of a Nova Scotia ship to haul down the Canadian flag on penalty of a fine of \$500, was not only harsh and high-handed, but in defiance of a warrant of the British Admiralty. When Mr. Easbach, M.P., owner of the ship, brought up the matter in the House of Commons recently, the opinion was expressed in his correspondence that such a warrant had been issued. The Minister of Marine, to whom Mr. Easbach's remarks on that occasion were addressed, probably overlooked the matter, and to-day the member for Lunenburg, N.S., just before prorogation, brought up the question again. He had obtained, he said, a copy of the admiralty warrant, which he read as follows:

"Whereas we deem it expedient that Canadian registered vessels shall be permitted to wear the red ensign of Her Majesty's fleet, with a Canadian coat of arms on the fly thereof.

"We do, by virtue of the power and authority vested in us, hereby warrant and authorize the red ensign of Her Majesty, with the Canadian coat of arms on the fly, to be used on board vessels registered in the Dominion.

"Given under our hand and the seal of the office of the Admiralty this 2nd day of February, 1892."

In accordance with this permission the Dominion Government adopted a regulation in regard to the Canadian flag as follows:

"The area of the shield shall in no case exceed one-fourth the area of the Union Jack of the particular ensign. The shield shall be placed centrally in that part of the flag which is beyond the Jack."

This is the correct Canadian red ensign which ships registered in the Dominion are entitled to fly the world over.

More Missionaries for India.  
The Executive of the Presbyterian Foreign Mission closed their annual session yesterday afternoon in Knox Church.

A call was extended to Rev. Alexander Don of Dunedin, New Zealand, to succeed Rev. A. B. Winchester as superintendent of mission work among the Chinese of British Columbia.

If the medical men are satisfied as to the health of Mr. W. G. Russell of Knox College and Mr. F. J. Anderson of Montreal, these gentlemen will go to the mission in Central India.

Enquiries will be made concerning the opening of a mission in Macao, China, for the purpose of establishing closer relations with Chinese who come to Canada and afterwards return Christianized to their native land.

## AN ASSASSIN IS A SUICIDE

Bresci Made a Rope From His Blankets and Strangled Himself on Tuesday Night.

FRIENDS SAY HE WAS MURDERED.

His Wife Says His Killing of Humbert Was Original and Not Due to a Plot.

Rome, May 23.—Bresci, the assassin of the late King Humbert, has committed suicide at the Penitentiary of Santo Stefano.

Bresci recently had been suffering from extreme excitement, declared to be from nervousness. Tuesday evening he made a rope from his blankets and strangled himself.

On the wall of Bresci's cell the word "Vengeance" was scratched with his bloody hands.

Bresci's violence last week culminated in his attacking a jailer, in consequence of which he was placed in a strait jacket. Later the prisoner feigned docility in order to secure an opportunity to commit suicide, which he accomplished by hanging himself with an improvised rope, attached to the ceiling.

At a cabinet council held at the Quirinal today, Signor Giolitti, Minister of the Interior, informed the King of the suicide of Bresci. His Majesty remained pensive for a few moments, and then said: "It is perhaps the best thing that could have happened to the unhappy man."

NEVER WAS A PLOT.

New York, May 23.—Speaking of her husband's act in killing the King of Italy, Mrs. Bresci said:

"He did not plan it with others. Now that he is gone there is no reason to conceal anything, and I can say absolutely that there never was a plot. It was said my husband was a leader and the agent of a band of anarchists in killing the King.

"That is not true. His act was entirely an individual act. He conceived it himself. The Patterson anarchists were surprised he did it as I was. They did not believe it at first.

"Anarchy from the little I have read of it is a propaganda that is too good for this world. It is not practical. That is the trouble with it and that was the trouble with my husband."

Say He Was Murdered.  
Patterson, N.J., May 23.—The news that Gaetano Bresci, the assassin of King Humbert, had committed suicide in the penitentiary of Santo Stefano, caused great excitement among the anarchists in this city.

They said that the assassin actually took his life the anarchists will not for a moment admit. They say that Bresci was murdered at the instigation of the Italian officials. Pedro Esteve, editor of the Italian paper, La Question Sociale, and one of the leaders of the anarchists here, said there was no doubt in his mind that Bresci had been murdered.

A number of the strikers at the Paragon silk mills who are members of the Anarchist group held a meeting today to discuss Bresci's death.

SPENT \$450,000 IN SEVEN YEARS.

Princess Chimay Wasted a Fortune—Her Uncle Will Now Handle Her Money.

New York, May 23.—The Herald prints the following from Chicago: Princess Chimay could not resist the temptation of every little fancy that crossed her mind, and was given to very great extravagance, the woman who was formerly Clara Ward of Detroit, afterward Princess de Chimay, and is now the wife of a famous Egyptian musician, Janaki Rigo, was declared a spendthrift today by a jury in Judge Cutting's court and deprived of the right to manage her own money.

The action of the Court was not without the full consent and knowledge of the Princess. Mrs. Lyon, was appointed her legal conservator, and in the future will only give to the Princess such money as is required for her living expenses.

This action was taken as a result of a petition filed in the Probate Court by Mr. Lyon, in which he set forth that his niece was a spendthrift, and utterly incapable of managing her own financial affairs. He stated that Princess Chimay, in addition to her annual income of \$25,000, had, during the last seven years, spent more than \$450,000 of her principal, and that unless some immediate step was taken she would soon be reduced to poverty.

The action of the Court was not without the full consent and knowledge of the Princess. Mrs. Lyon, was appointed her legal conservator, and in the future will only give to the Princess such money as is required for her living expenses.

Without another word she added her name to the petition.
