ST. THOMAS AGAIN SUCCUMBS.

The Londoners finished a brilliant week on Saturday, winning five out of six games. Four out of the five victories were achieved after the hardest kind of work and by a narrow plurality of runs. Three straight wins were taken from St. Thomas, and they were three of the finest ever seen on the home grounds. There was a strong undercurrent of sympathy for the Saints. They put up such a splendid and plucky article of ball that local enthusiasts would have been somewhat pained to see them score at least one triumph, just as they had done in the St. Thomas people. Certainly the Saints have traveled in the hardest kind of luck. They have played perhaps as well as any other team in the league, but have an unhappy knack of being a run or two behind. On Saturday the demon of ill-luck still pursued them. On four occasions they had chances of tying the score, but the run that they longed for came too late. Clark was in the box again and distinguished himself for the second time in three days. St. Thomas' weakness is not in the box; in fact, it is hard to point out any defect in the team, excepting a general inability to make enough runs.

The Londoners again delighted their admirers by clean and snappy ball. Beale divided honors with Clark, and his delivery was handled perfectly by Bates, who proved himself a model catcher—active and vigilant. Both in field and outfield achieved some grand stand plays. As fielders, the present nine have never been excelled.

London got its lead in the first by a charity to Howell, a wild pitch, a single by Keenan, an error by Sheehan and a single by Ward. Until the eighth run another run was scored on either side. The Londoners went out in one-two-three order. The Saints hit the ball hard but not often. In the third Clark made a triple, Howell misjudging the ball. Only one man was out, and things looked so rosy that the several scores of St. Thomas rosters in the stand began to play their mouth organs. Reid got a charity, and both men attempted a simultaneous steal, but Clark was caught at the plate. In the sixth again Clark led off with a single, but an error by Sheehan at second stopped stupid base-running. Martin made a double, and Sheehan got first on an error, but both men stayed on the bases.

In the seventh inning, Bussé singled and actually reached third through Kellackey's sacrifice and a wild pitch, but Howell gathered in two flies after beautiful runs, and St. Thomas hopes were again dashed. In the ninth they broke the goose-egg at last. Sheehan flied out, and Humphrey singled, but was forced out by Bussé's ground. Kellackey was hit by the pitcher. Rodden knocked a hot one, which struck and glanced off Beale. Bussé scored, and Kellackey died in trying to steal. In the eighth singles by Beale and Howell and a timely double by Jo-Jo save London another.
