SHE SCREAMED.
Galt Burglars Foiled in Their Scheme by the Outcries of a Girl.

Galt, Nov. 6.—Miss Jackson, housekeeper for A. Oliver, Preston road, was aroused about 12:30 yesterday morning by the sound of footsteps in her room. Soon muffled voices were also heard, and in a few moments a candle was held to her face and she was surrounded by three masked men. One warned her not to make an outcry, but, not heeding him, the girl gave utterance to shriek after shriek. The man who had spoken caught hold of her and tried to intimidate her with a revolver. Finally, the robbers searched the bureau drawers, and were rewarded by finding Miss Jackson's purse, containing \$5 35, which they took possession of.

In the interval the girl had not ceased to scream, and at this juncture, she says, the ruffian pulled the weapon at her. It exploded, but did no harm, and was eventually only loaded with powder. "Advertiser's" Celebration.

A Third of a Century It has Prospered and Progressed. The Staff, Together With Former Associates, Participate.

Its Founder, President and Manager Entertains the Staff and Employees. Editor of the Globe, Hon. David Mills, and Others.

Interesting Reminiscences—Remarkable Changes Which Have Taken Place Under Mr. Cameron's Regime—Progress in Every Department—What Makes a Successful Journal—The Advertising Public and Their Relation to Good Journalism—This is the Advertiser's Day: It Only Occurs Once in 33 Years.

Last evening a company consisting mainly of the staff and employees of The London Advertiser, to the number of some 60 persons, sat down together to discuss the substantial and elegant bill of fare prepared and served in Fyfe's best style. The tables were decorated with flowers, the general effect being decidedly artistic. In one corner of the room was a piano, upon which, as accompanist, Mr. Victor Colwell assisted the musical director, Mr. C. H. Fowling, and the other musically disposed members of the establishment in the various selections with which the after-dinner proceedings were interspersed.

The occasion was the completion of the 33rd year and the entrance upon the 34th, of the publication of The London Advertiser—making it practically a third of a century celebration. The guests present were confined exclusively to those now or formerly connected with the Advertiser. Other former Advertiser associates it is hoped to have present on another occasion.

THE CHAIRMAN'S ADDRESS. Mr. John Cameron, as chairman, then made the following address: "It is a third of a century since I founded The London Advertiser. It started about the size of a copy-book. Yet there are a number who have been connected with the establishment for periods varying from a quarter of a century down."

ed east, west and north by the Atlantic, the Pacific, and Hudson's Bay. When The Advertiser started the principal use of electricity was in the conveying of overland telegraphic messages. THE DOWN-STAIRS OFFICE. Mr. J. D. Clarke, editor of The Advertiser, proposed the toast of "The Down-Stairs Office," which evoked cheers and the chorus "For They Are Jolly Good Fellows." Mr. Clarke said: "I am glad to be here to rejoice with you, Mr. Chairman, in celebrating the anniversary of the life of The Advertiser, and of your continuous headship of the journal."

"If an establishment such as ours is to be successful, we must at all times have the most cordial co-operation between every department. Especially it is necessary to have the best of understanding between those who endeavor to fill the various editions of the paper with the freshest of news, and those who appropriate a portion of the space for that vital popular information—the advertisements—I refer to the business office. I need not remind you that while we of the editorial department must stand between the business managers and those who would at times try to have advertisements classed as news, we recognize the usefulness of the business staff in helping us to make The Advertiser increasingly attractive to its many thousands of readers. We expect them not only to help us in supplying the city editor's staff with every 'tip' that comes their way, but we look to them to keep their persons alive to the importance of making announcements to the public at all times fresh, interesting, as full of news as the local or telegraphic intelligence."

"Through the aid of the advertiser alone can the modern newspaper, with its manifold attractions, be produced. How useful it is then that advertisers should at all times be shown that they are getting full value for their money. Enterprising advertisers do get full value.
