JAPANESE PARADE OF 7,000 MEN

of the Asiatics will mean a diminution in the number of whites already there, as the latter cannot compete with the foreigners in cheapness of labor. This, perhaps, an extreme view of the situation, but it was given expression to at a public meeting held in Vancouver a few nights ago. The labor unions are taking part in the agitation against Asiatics, and an impetus appears to have been given to the movement by the parade of 7,000 Japanese in Vancouver on the occasion of Prince Fushimi's visit. This demonstration revealed the extent to which Asiatic labor is employed in the district. It is only fair to say that public opinion is not all on one side, and that there are many British Columbians who do not share in these views.

A Resolution. It is of interest to mention that at the Vancouver meeting referred to a resolution was passed urging upon the Governments of British Columbia and the Dominion of Canada the necessity of immediately prohibiting the immigration of Asiatics to Canada. The reasons enumerated in the resolution include the following: "British Columbia is the western gateway of the Dominion. If it is ever attacked on that coast its defenders must be its own people. If the masses are an alien race with foreign sympathies, it needs no argument to show how easily a foreign nation could obtain a foothold here, and, once obtained, how difficult to dislodge. We cannot conceive that the nations affected by an act of exclusion could object to the measures, as, if they were threatened by similar conditions, they would speedily adopt similar measures against us. The question today is of easy solution. In time, where these men are not only laborers, but merchants and manufacturers, with large material interests in the country, their progress can only be prevented at the expense of the peaceful relations now existing between this country and Japan."

The traction company will supply its own power and the cars will be operated on the main thoroughfare about Wednesday or Thursday.

A Warning for Londoners.

A Toronto dispatch says: "Breath of the Lottery Act was the offense for which Thomas Banks had to pay a fine in the police court yesterday morning. Several weeks ago Banks had a cow which he did not want. He decided to dispose of it by the old-time raffish method, but in doing so he was committing a 'breach' of the law regarding lotteries. A dispute over the result of the raffie attracted the attention of the authorities, and an information was sworn out against Banks. He pleaded guilty ten days ago, and came up for sentence yesterday. Col. Denison imposed a fine of \$5 and costs of 30 days."

VANCOUVER RIOTS WERE PLANNED

Strong Statement From Seattle—Tokio Officials Are Not Disturbed.

Portland, Oregon, Sept. 10.—The Oregonian today prints a dispatch from Seattle, Wash., which says: "The significance of the Vancouver riots were carefully planned to impress K. Ishii, chief of the bureau of foreign commerce. It is significant that the leaders of the Seattle organization against Japanese immigration were in Vancouver heading a demonstration. Frank W. Connell, president of the Washington State Federation of Labor; E. A. Fowler, secretary of the Anti-Japanese and Korean Immigration League; George P. Listman, prominent Seattle labor leader, all were present, together with a big delegation of anti-Japanese sympathizers."

The significance of the Vancouver riots dates back to a programme evolved when it was announced that Ishii was coming to Seattle. It was then decided and telegraphed out of Seattle that the anti-Oriental organizations proposed to present Ishii, while he was in Seattle, a demonstration against Japanese immigration. At the time this plan was formulated it was believed Ishii would spend a week in Seattle, and then go to Vancouver. There was planned at a conference between Vancouver, B. C., and Seattle anti-Japanese leaders all the details for a big anti-Japanese demonstration in Vancouver, Sept. 12.

It developed that Ishii did not have time to spend in Seattle, and he went through to Vancouver. Simultaneously with his going the local leaders of the anti-Japanese society went north. The Vancouver demonstration against the outbreak occurred, and the announcement is made in private letters from anti-Japanese leaders that he harangued the mob not to do violence, the society itself believes the demonstration had to do with their presence. It was impossible to present a big anti-petition to Ishii here, and he refused to remain long enough for the Vancouver demonstration Sept. 12. There is no question whether Seattle, Portland or San Francisco agitators took part. The great bulk of the marching and rioting throng was composed of Canadians, and the Japanese officials ignored American participants in the telegram of protest to the Ottawa Government.

Tokio, Sept. 10.—The most meager accounts of the anti-Japanese trouble in Vancouver, B. C., is published in a special cablegram to the Asahi this morning. While awaiting details, the Asahi refrains from editorial comment. The published dispatch, which is from Ishii, of the Japanese bureau of commerce, is brief, and expresses the opinion that the trouble is over. The Japanese press and officials generally show no disturbance over the immigration question, and it is conceded in official circles that the matter will be ultimately settled satisfactorily, although sporadic outbreaks are expected. The Japanese officials decline to say what steps, if any, have been taken in the Canadian trouble, pending further information.

London, Sept. 10.—The Daily Mail, in its issue of today does not mention the Vancouver incident editorially, but prints an interesting, sensational article by Hamilton Puff, who is evidently familiar with the Pacific Coast countries of America and the Orient, and who sums up the incident by saying: "The trouble is that it has not happened before."

He says that California and British Columbia have the same problem to puzzle over, and agrees with Dr. Goldwin Smith that "Before many years there must be a supreme struggle between Europeans and Asiatics for supremacy on the Pacific Coast."

YEAR 5665 OF JEWISH CALENDAR

Ceremonies Will Be Continued Until Next Tuesday.

The ceremonies of the Jewish year 5665, which was ushered in on Sunday night at twilight, will be continued until next Tuesday, when the Day of Atonement sets in, and from Tuesday until Wednesday at sunset no Jew in the city will partake of food or drink of any kind. The Jewish New Year is always celebrated for two days, and those days usher in the ten days of penitence, which terminates by the observance of the Day of Atonement, which commences on Tuesday evening and terminates at sunset Wednesday. On that day a solemn fast is observed. No food or water or any nourishment is taken for 24 hours. The day is spent in the synagogues in the recital of penitential compositions and solemn prayers for forgiveness. This day is memorable in the Jewish calendar, as even the most lax of the Jewish community observe it in some benighting manner. It was on that day alone that the high priest entered the Holy of Holies, where the temple was in existence on Mount Zion, and within its sacred inclosure made atonement for himself and his household, and the whole congregation of Israel.

Five days after the Day of Atonement comes the Feast of the Tabernacle, which is observed in the synagogues, when private individuals erect a tabernacle in memory of the time when the Israelites adjourned in tents in the wilderness for forty years.

Among the interesting ceremonies on the Jewish New Year is the ceremony of casting away the sins, which, however, is not observed by the enlightened Jews. It is a superstitious practice, but nevertheless an interesting one. Many Jews were seen yesterday along the water front, casting everything they had in their pockets into the water, and at the same time muttering prayers. It is believed by some that in so doing they are carrying out the instructions given in the Book of Micah, and they believe that the Almighty will cast away their sins in the same manner as they throw away their belongings.

LAKE DISASTER IS RECALLED

Fisherman Finds Wreck of the Dean Richmond—Sunk With All Hands.

Dunkirk, Sept. 10.—Gus Ormsby, a fisherman, while lifting his nets off Van Buren Point, in Lake Erie, discovered the wreck of the propeller Dean Richmond, which was lost in a storm, with all on board during a gale in October, 1895.

The Dean Richmond has a cargo of lead and copper valued at \$200,000, and vain attempts had been made by the underwriters, and by private enterprise to locate the bones of the treasure ship.

BORDEN AT OWEN SOUND

Charges Favoritism on Intercolonial—Attack on Mr. MacKay.

Owen Sound, Sept. 10.—Mr. R. L. Borden was accorded a most flattering reception on his arrival here this afternoon in the course of his tour of Ontario. Foully met, along with his party were escorted from the C. P. R. station to the skating rink, was lavishly decorated with flags, bunting and mottoes, and the large crowds lining it warmly greeted him. At the rink both the afternoon and the latter in fact fairly testing the accommodation of the building, which is of considerable size. Mr. Chas. T. Sutherland, of Meaford, president of the North Grey Conservative Association, occupied the chair at both meetings.

An incident of the night meeting was a severe attack made by Mr. Boyd, who delivered the opening address, on Mr. A. G. MacKay, M.P.P., for North Grey. "The Provincial Liberals," he declared, "are thoroughly disorganized. They do not know where they are going to get a leader."

A voice—Mr. MacKay. (Cheers and applause.)

Mr. Boyd—What a snap Premier Whitney would have. (Counter cheers and applause.)

"We all know," he went on, "that only two weeks ago Mr. MacKay was trying to get the nomination, so as to cut out Mr. Telford, the member for the Dominion House, because he thought he would, if elected, fill Mr. Emerson's shoes. The respectable Reformers of Ontario are anxious to get a clean leader, and I ask could they get that in Mr. MacKay? If the respectable Reformers could have followed Mr. MacKay's course for the last thirty days, they would not touch him with a forty-foot pole."

During his addresses Mr. Borden, who was frequently applauded, devoted considerable time, as did all the other speakers, to alleged cases of graft and political corruption, in which those concerned had received remuneration and offices from the Government. He also alluded at some length to the Halifax platform. In this connection, and while urging his views as to a non-political basis for appointment to the civil service, he spoke of the Intercolonial Railway. He was not desiring, he said, to reflect on any of the leading officials, but he knew that in his own Province of Nova Scotia there was absolutely no discipline on the Intercolonial Railway. Men were appointed, not because they were good railway men, but because they had a pull and did work for the Government in the elections. Dealing with the record of the Government, he contended that he did at the Chatham meetings, that they kept only one of their promises, and that was the repeal of the franchise act.

Owen Sound and other sections of Grey being under local option, the question of prohibition is naturally a live one here, and Mr. Borden touched upon it without committing himself or his party.

HARVEST OUTLOOK

IS MUCH BRIGHTER

Winnipeg, Sept. 10.—Some heavy frosts in Northern Alberta—Sunday night have caused some damage to backward wheat, but very hot weather is reported today.

No serious damage is reported by frost from Saskatchewan points, and in many places harvesting is in full swing.

Specially good reports come from the Indian Head district, and large numbers of farmers are cutting, and some have finished.

Lethbridge district states all the grain is safe from frost, except a few late oats.

Unprecedented sales of binders and twine are reported from a large number of points, and there is a great scarcity of harvesters.

Wheat-cutting is finished in many places throughout Manitoba, and barley is nearly all cut. Fine weather has caused revision of the estimates, and the average yield will be double that estimated two months ago, at a large number of points.
