Left There Yesterday for London in Charge of Detective Nickle.

Brown Talks Quietly About His Movements, but Fights Shy of Any Reference to the Crime He Is Wanted For-The Police as Reticent as

The city police are still as mysterious as ever, and claim to know much less about the peg-leg than the newspapers. They claim they do not know when the peg-leg will arrive. The following dispatch was received this

morning: Winnipeg, Man., Oct. 14.—Peg-leg Brown, the alleged murderer of Constable Toohey, at London, Ont., passed through this city yesterday, en route to London, where he will stand his trial. He is in charge of Detective Nickle. United States Marshal Dalley, who effected Brown's capture, accompanies Nickle to claim the reward offerel. Brown has admitted his identity. While here Brown's face wore a pleasant, unconcerned smile, and during the short time the fetters were removed he puffed nochalantly at a cigarette, wholly unmindful of the crowd of sightseers which pressed around him on all sides.

There seems to be litte doubt but that he is the man wanted for the murder. He is securely handcuffed, and the officers are confident about landing him safely behind the bars.

MONEY WENT

The Board of Works Want Some Badly, But-

The Stone Crusher Has Eaten Up a Tidy Sum-Its Surprising Cost Compared With Last Year.

At a recent meeting of the city council, Ald. Nutkins quietly asked the chairman of the board of works for a statement of the work done by the stone crusher this year, and its expense to the city. Ald. Douglass just as quietly agreed to produce the statement, and the incident passed almost unno-The statement has been pre ticed. pared, and it is a safe prediction that its reception by the council on Monday night next will not be particularly

placid. Kind-hearted and far-sighted aldermen whose keenest delight is to dispense street improvements to obliging ratepayers are exasperated because there are no funds at their disposal in the treasury. All the favors of the office have slipped through their fingers. Yet there are many ratepayers by whom they are pressed for street or sidewalk repairs, or improvements of one sort or another. A few planks here and there throughout the ward would be worth a lot at the next election, and, incidentally, they might save citizens from breaking their bones on dangerous sidewalks. With each alderman thinking of how much ought to be done for his ward, yet realizing that the money is all gone, it is no wonder the civic waters are troubled. and Ald. Douglass' statement will only increase the storm, because it will set the aldermen thinking of what might have been. It will reveal several hundred dollars locked up in unbroken stone. It will set those aldermen who are careful of the interests of their wards speculating as to how much good might have been done if they had some of the money expended per cord for crushing the stone this year in excess of the cost of previous years. In short,

a warm reception awaits Ald. Douglass' statement. Ald. Cooper, whose batteries have been directed against the management of the stone-crusher all year, says emphatically that the stone could have been broken cheaper by hand than it has cost to do it by the machine this year. At the beginning of the season contracts were let for the supply of unbroken stone, at about \$2 per cord, the quantity being unlimited. New men were put to work on the machine The number of bosses was increased from one to three, and wages were correspondingly increased. some reason a proportionately small amount of broken stone was turned out. Last year five teams, averaging

twelve loads each, or 60 loads per day, drew the stone from the crusher. This year one and two teams did the work, and the average was seven loads per day. Five blocks were macadamized last year, and one block this year. All the stone that was supplied to the crusher last year was broken. This year, of the 700 cords supplied, about half remains unbroken. Had it all been broken and used in permanent improvements the board of works would have got a return for it, as they receive credit from the city treasurer for the sum paid by the ratepayers for such work, and those dangerous sidewas moved repeatedly in council, by Ald. Cooper to have the drawing of stone to the crusher stopped earlier in the season, but the chairman of the

board of works did not see it that Now he will have to explain to the fourth warder why the broken stone The annual thank-offering meeting cost the city this year from \$3 50 to \$3 75 per cord more than last. Estimating the excess cost per cord of the 350 cords of broken stone at \$3 75, the total is over \$1,300. Estimating the cost of the unbroken stone at \$2 per cord, there is \$700, or a total of about \$2,000 that the board of works would be very glad to have at their disposal now, in the days of their adversity.
