> It is now thirty-nine years since the confederation of provinces was inaugurated to make a Dominion Day and a union that has been a blessing to the country, and in all that time there has probably been no year of greater fulfillment or greater promise than the present one. Certainly all the talk in Ontario is of unexampled prosperity. One hears the same tune north and south of the great lakes. Business is booming, cities are growing rapidly. Then, too, all Canada is full of the marvels of the Northwest. Men have visions of a vastly increased territory, and look for something resembling our own tremendous growth.

> Their prophecies may never come true, but the richness of some portions of the country is proved, and immigration is already responding in a marked degree to the tales that are told. For the eleven months last reported the total came to some 155,000, which is undoubtedly a noteworthy figure. Though it looks small by comparison with our yearly records that exceed a million, it is relatively large in proportion to the population, and apparently the tide that way is setting in very strong.

Nor is there as yet any fear of serous immigration problems. The people for the most part are from the British Isles or from a farming population across the border, and are gladly welcomed to a share in the opportunities and in the general prosperity of the country.

It is a pleasure to add that the Canadians seem to have the best of feeling toward the United States, and the season of holidays is a good season for mutual congratulations. Canada gained much from the effect of the American revolution upon British policies; the United States is gaining every day through the growth of Canada. The enormous business between the two countries is in fact very beneficial to both, and the people have so much in common that they should feel closely united even without a political union.


