tween the closing walls! In the event of ice closing in on a ship sailing in a belt of water bordered on its inner side by an iron-hard beach, the craft may escape if she be near some bar formation at the moment; for if she succeed in getting inside that shallow ground, safety for the time being is assured, as the landward-moving floe invariably strikes and piles upon the shoal, forming a bulwark, fixed and immovable, under whose lee the craft may lie in safety. If, however, the ice pack is thin, the vessel cannot escape being carried sidewise upon the beach
