KITCHENER FIRMS WILL NOT SUFFER, DECLARES EULER

No Permanent Prejudice Against Free Voters, Is Victor's View.

KITCHENER, Dec. 18.—The most dramatic and sensational year in the history of an Ontario municipal council closed quietly tonight. The spectators' chamber, which two weeks ago was thronged with a crowd demanding an apology to Premier Borden, was deserted, and there were no ratepayers present for the passing of a bylaw raising the mayor's salary to \$1,000 a year, only business of a routine nature was transacted.

Complete returns in North Waterloo give W. D. Euler, Liberal, 5,222 votes; W. G. Weichsel, Unionist, 2,923, and M. Smith, Socialist, 256, giving Euler a majority of 2,298 over Weichsel, and a plurality of 4,967 in a statement today Mr. Euler stated that the vote shows the dissatisfaction over the Government disfranchising so many in the riding, and they also registered their objection to the conscription act.

Mr. Euler stated that he has no doubt that harm will result to the industries of the riding. "Canadians have a sense of justice and they will not permit permanent prejudice against people who have exercised their rights as free citizens to vote," he said.

Mr. Weichsel felt he did his duty for the riding as a British-Canadian, and had no regrets. "Having done my duty even though the duty was misunderstood by a majority in North Waterloo leaves me proud in the knowledge I was true to my country and myself," he said.

ENGINEER DROWNED WHEN LOCOMOTIVE BACKED INTO RIVER

Drawbridge at Port Huron Was Left Open in Fog.

SARNIA, Dec. 18.—When a Pere Marquette engine, which was backing up at the south approach to the Black River railroad bridge, dropped over into the river this morning, Engineer J. H. McIntosh, of 124 Grosvenor street, was drowned, and Fireman Gus Henning, of 827 Pine street, had a narrow escape from a similar fate. The accident occurred about seven o'clock.

Owing to a fog the bridge warning signals and the big engine, drawing a string of cars backed along the track just as the bridge was opened to let the ferry crosser go. The train was moving at a slow speed, and engine and tender dropped out of sight into the river.

Both men jumped and started to swim which was almost impossible, owing to floating ice. At present the front wheels of the engine are hanging to the track with the tender and cab submerged. It will require a tug to raise the engine from its position. Henning was rescued, and is suffering from exposure and shock. McIntosh's body was recovered.

RECRUITING DRIVE IN DETROIT MAY YIELD SEVERAL BATTALIONS

Estimated 20,000 Canadians of Draft Age Are Available.

DETROIT, Dec. 18.—Working in conjunction with a number of organizations, including St. Andrew's, St. George's and the Order of Scottish Clans, the British recruiting mission in Detroit tonight at a mass meeting inaugurated a recruiting drive which is hoped will yield several thousand draft age who are living in Detroit.

Major J. P. Templeton, in charge of the campaign, made a strong address in St. Andrew's Hall this evening, using a large lantern with topographical markings to illustrate his arguments.

CAPT. MCKINNON WOUNDED. PRICEVILLE, Dec. 18.—Capt. H. B. McKinnon, has been wounded. The official message states he was slightly wounded by a bullet in the chest. He is now recovering in a hospital.

On the formation of the 10th he was made adjutant. When the Perth went overseas, he was transferred to the Royal Flying Corps and had been in France since November 5. Prior to enlistment he was on the staff of the Toronto Globe, and conducted the agricultural page under the title of "Timothy Spray."

McKinnon was killed in action in October.

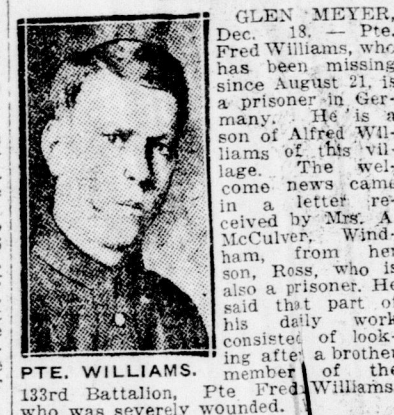

The Jacob Jones was torpedoed and sunk in the war zone on December 6, and 65 men on board were missing. Survivors reported that one American who spoke German was taken away a prisoner on the U-boat.

ADMIT PARTICIPATION BUT DENY KNOWLEDGE OF DYNAMITE PLOTS

Defendants Declare They Did Not Know of Conspiracy.

DETROIT, Dec. 18.—Three of the five persons on trial here with Albert C. Katschmidt, on charges of conspiracy to destroy public and private property in the United States and Canada, today admitted participation in the alleged plots, but declared that at the time they did not know what was being done.

Fritz Neef, Franz Respa, a native of Germany, 70 years of age, and Charles Schmidt, the defendants, who testified today.

Neef testified that Katschmidt told him of dynamite plots, and he protested, saying: "No god would accuse to Germany by killing innocent persons." Neef told Katschmidt, he testified, that he would have nothing to do with the plans.

He testified also that a meeting was held at a local hotel at which means of bringing an embargo on munitions ships to the Allies were discussed. Katschmidt, he said, worked hard for this plan.

Respa, through an interpreter, said dynamite was brought to his home by his daughter, Mrs. Carl Schmidt, also a trial, and William J. Rosch, who testified recently for the Government. He did not know, he testified, why the dynamite was brought to his home.

Schmidt testified that Katschmidt asked him to do some work for him. He was asked, he said, to get information concerning railroad tracks, particularly whether they were single or double tracks, at different places. He said he did not know Katschmidt's reasons for wanting the information.

Further evidence tended to show that Katschmidt is charged with having received through German official sources a personal loan. He has introduced at the forenoon session, John Ballantyne, president of a local bank, testified that Katschmidt, in October, 1915, paid \$22,000 to two Toronto men for their interest in his salt factory at Marine City, Mich. The trial will be resumed tomorrow.

U. S. HOUSE TO VOTE ON SUFFRAGE ISSUE

Amendment Will Be Passed Upon Early Next Month.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—Vote in the House on the woman suffrage constitutional amendment on Thursday, January 19, was assured today, when the rules committee agreed on that date.

TEST VOTE IN FAVOR. WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—On a test vote today, indicating sentiment in the House toward the woman suffrage constitutional amendment, the suffragists polled seven more than a two-thirds vote. The question was a referring suffrage resolutions to the new woman suffrage committee as the suffragists, instead of the elections committee as the anti-suffragists asked.

GOVERNOR OF CALIF TARGET OF BOMBERS

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Dec. 13.—Governor Stevens, whose official residence here was damaged last night by a dynamite explosion, characterized the action in a statement tonight as "probably having been done with a view to terrorizing the chief weapon of an alien enemy."

U. S. CREATES BUREAU TO CHECK TRADE WITH FOE

NEW YORK, Dec. 18.—The appointment of John Henry Hammond, of the New York banking firm of Brown Brothers & Company, as director of the bureau of enemy trade, with headquarters at Washington, D.C., was announced here today. The bureau is a department of the war trade board, and has charge of the issuing, or refusing, of licenses to deal with an enemy or ally of an enemy.

SENATE OF FRANCE TO DISCUSS PUBLISHER

Immunity of Charles Humbert Is Suspended.

PARIS, Dec. 18.—The Senate today without discussion voted to suspend the immunity of Senator Charles Humbert, former proprietor of the Journal, in accordance with the demand of the public prosecutor. In the Chamber, M. Palsant reported that he had drawn up for the Chamber's committee of eleven on the question of the suspension of the immunity of Senators Caillaux and Loustalot. The report was adopted by seven members of the committee voting for it and four abstaining from voting. The report requested the Chamber to discuss the report Saturday.

SOLDIERS' VOTE WILL NOT DEFEAT KENNEDY BUT MAY BEAT ATKIN

Col. Wigle Cannot Hope to Overcome Monster Majority.

WINDSOR, Dec. 18.—That the vote cast by the soldiers will not materially affect the result of the parliamentary election in North Essex for William C. Kennedy, Liberal, over Lieut.-Col. E. S. Wigle, Unionist, by a plurality of 1,382, was admitted today by Barrister F. C. Kirby, a member of Wigle's executive committee.

It is estimated there are between 1,200 to 1,500 soldiers overseas who can be classed as North Essex electors. These men resided in the border constituency more than six months prior to enlistment, which gives them the right to vote here. As Col. Wigle cannot expect to receive all the votes of soldiers who come in the category of North Essex electors, the majority of the Liberal candidate will not be out by more than 1,000 at the outside, Mr. Kirby said, by the ballots cast by men of North Essex overseas, so that the defeat of Kennedy can only be possible by use of the unattached vote.

The greatest surprise of the day was that Windsor gave Kennedy a majority of more than 100, the second time in the history of North Essex federal politics that a Liberal candidate has been so favored by the city electors, indicating that despite the organized effort of several hundred female workers for Col. Wigle, the women relatives of the men serving overseas, numbering 1,200 or more, did not go solidly for the soldier candidate as expected.

According to Col. Wigle, the manifesto issued by Bishop Fallon of London asking Catholic electors of Western Ontario to support Union did not assist the Union cause.

The bishop's appeal for support of Union Government was not heeded by Irish Catholics, and on the other hand, it had the effect of stirring up the French-Canadians," said the defeated candidate as expected.

Although Robert Atkin, the Liberal, was elected in South Essex, a majority of about 1,000, it is certain this plurality will be offset by the soldiers' votes which are claimed by Dr. Brian, the Union candidate.

DORCHESTER, Dec. 18.—Henry Finch, aged 73, one of North Dorchester's prominent residents, died at his home in Harrietsville last night, after a two years' illness with pernicious anaemia. He was for many years township auditor.

He leaves his wife and eight children: Mrs. L. L. York, Laurie, Elton and Douglas of Harrietsville; Walker of London, Wesley of Toronto, Hillard of Manitoba, and Claude of Kincardine. Ten sisters and brothers also survive: Mrs. L. McTavish and Miss Nellie Finch, Belmont; Mrs. Pawcett, Toronto; Mrs. S. Ballin, and Mrs. Jackson in the west; Mrs. R. Sherk, North Bay; Denzil and Culver of Mapleton; John of Aylmer, and Galatan of Mandanville.

The funeral will be held from her late residence on Thursday afternoon. Rev. E. S. Clifton will conduct the services and interment will be made at the Union Cemetery.

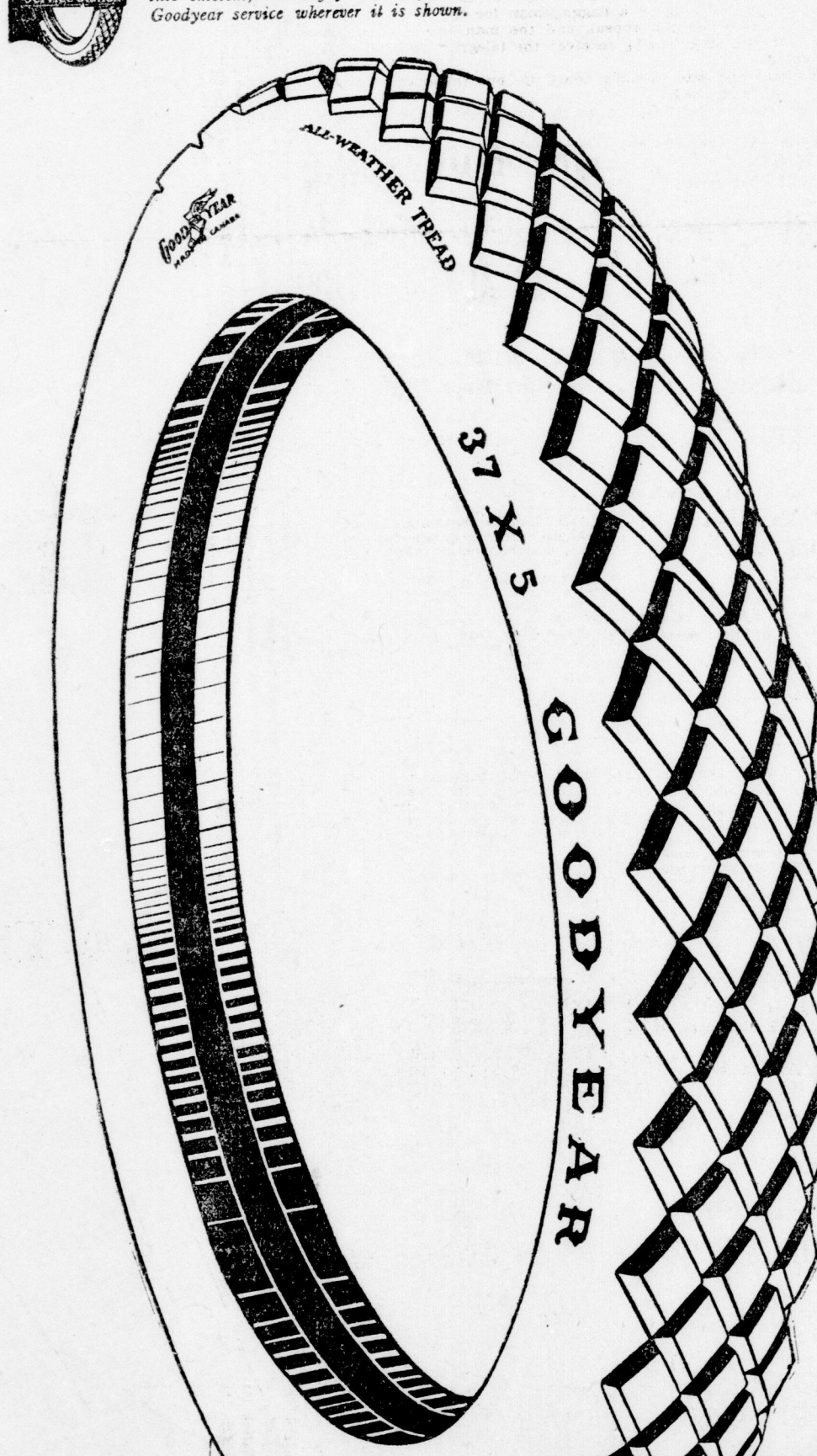
