Announce Free Medical Treatment For All Y. M. C. A. Members in Future.

HEAR GOOD PROGRAM AT CONVENTION OF MIDDLESEX TEACHERS Large Audience Entertained at Evening Session in Normal School.

The Conservative party will also open their campaign in Lambton County next week. While the Liberals are the inactive party here for the provincial election rumour, it is not so for the federal election. They are already marshalling their forces in preparation for the federal election.

The publicity committee of the Lambton County war loan drive met tonight, and will try this year to shatter previous records.

Price Vegetables. Lambton County is well illustrated by several samples of corn and sugar beets in the possession of James Couss. The corn has on exhibition an ear of white Wisconsin number 7, with 85 kernels, and an excellent one of Yellow Learning Dent. The corn was grown on the farm of Henry Lawson, near Wanstead, and was picked by Mr. Couss yesterday. A field of sugar beets, the property of Alex. BROWER ON FIRST
APPEARANCE HERE
DELIGHTS AUDIENCE

Excellent Singing Wins Applause at Auditorium.

LONDON may well toss her head with pride that she has permanently within her gates such an artist as Herman Brower, who sang in recital at the Y. M. C. A. Auditorium last evening. With a rich baritone voice of unusual range, beauty and power, Brower almost immediately captured the interest of his audience but his heart was not completely in the final number, “When the Boys Come Home,” sung with intense fervor and vigor. In the matter of clear enunciation, Mr. Brower almost goes to the extreme, but still within the bounds of art. He doesn’t believe in taking the prevailing sloppiness of even the most correct speech into song. When he sings an “I” it is an “I,” and just a slur. His stage presence is alike modest and imposing and immediately makes friends with his audience. Beginning with the prologue from Pagliacci (Leoncavallo), he sang through an intensely interesting program with a group of tragic songs from Schubert, a French group, and finally, perhaps the favorite group of the evening, ending with Oley Speaks “When the Boys Come Home.”

This final group opened with MacFadden’s intensely religious song, “Inter Nos,” sung with almost fanatical abandon, and emphasizing to a remarkable degree the dramatic ability of the artist. This was followed by “The Voice” (Droz), a vigorous and dramatic song in which the unquenchable spirit of the Allies against the most terrible odds is the note struck, and again he displayed to advantage his dramatic power.

The Schubert numbers were also characterized by dramatic intensity, the “Death of the Maiden,” “My Phantom Double,” and “The Erlking,” keeping the same dominant note of pathos throughout, and in the first and last numbers contrasting the fear of death with the voice of the comforter. Obstinata (Fontaines), the first of the French group, showed the powerful, rich voice of the singer subdued to the softest pianissimo.

The Conservatory String Ensemble, making its first appearance this year, was another attractive feature of last night’s program. All instruments responded to the heart, producing harmonies which delighted the hearers. Miss Florence Davey, as leader of the first violins did excellent work supported by Miss Howena Weld and Master Walter Kender.

In the “Sous le Balcon” number by Wuerat, the cello speaks some beautiful passages by itself. This part was admirably executed by the Rev. Quintin Warner. Other ensemble numbers were “Bella” and Beethoven’s “Minuet,” which met with such applause that it was repeated.

The personnel of the ensemble was as follows: First violins, Miss Florence Davey; second violins, Stanley Byfield, Master Leigh Taylor, Misses Paul and Edith; violas, Misses Sarah and L. Wilkerson, Miss Edith Rosier; cellos, Rev. Quintin Warner, Mr. Lewin, and Master Kender.

Charles Percy made an excellent accompanist. The recital was under the direction of the Conservatory of Music, the managing directorship of which Mr. Brower has undertaken. He is also here in the capacity of a vocal teacher.

SQUIRRELS ARE TO
BE PROTECTED FOR
NEXT THREE YEARS

No Shooting or Hunting in Middlesex County.

Hunting, shooting, taking or selling black or grey squirrels in the County of Middlesex is forbidden from September 1 this year until September 1, 1922. This fact will come as a surprise to many sportsmen of London and surrounding country who have read the game laws for the season and have failed to find any such ruling. Nevertheless, it is law.

The fact is that the order-in-council was not approved in time to be included in the game laws schedule, but, having been approved, it is just as binding as if it had been printed in the little booklet.

The official notification of the order is as follows: The deputy minister of game and fisheries, Toronto, has advised the president of Clandeboye Bird and Game Association that an order-in-council was approved by his honor the lieutenant-governor on the 23rd August, 1919, upon the request of the Municipal Council of the County of Middlesex, forbidding the hunting and shooting of black and grey squirrels in the County of Middlesex for a period of three years from the 1st day of September, 1919.
