While remission of city taxes has | The tax rate in the annexed district, proved a real aid to many returned soldiers in the city there are a few who have not benefitted to the extent of a dollar. Some of them have received a remission of as little as six cents.

The tax rate in the annexed district, owing to the agreement under which this part of the city was annexed, is not part of the city was annexed, is adollar. The school rate this year is 14.63 mills. This means that there is less than one mill which the council has the power to remit, and in some instances this amounts to only a few dollar. Some of them have received a remission of as little as six cents.

These apparently miserly remissions are accounted for by the fact that these soldiers live in the annexed district. The act providing for the remission of taxes permits the city council to exempt returned men owning and living in homes assessed for less than \$3,000, in some instances this amounts to only a few cents.
