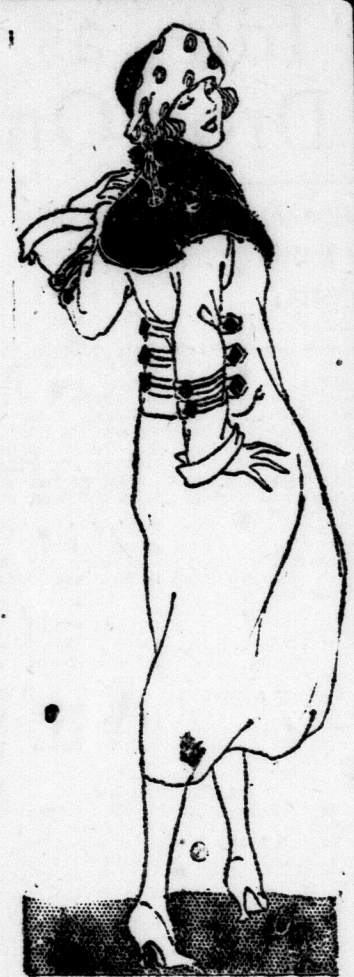

Forgot the Dime.

Dear Cynthia Grey—I am awfully ashamed of myself. In my letter I told you to find inclosed dime, but I guess you didn't. For there wasn't one. I forgot to put it in, but I won't forget this time. I am sending you a recipe for coconut ice. It is just wonderful. Hope you will forgive me.

Coconut Ice.—Half pound coconut, 1 lb. lump sugar, ¼ pt. water. Boil sugar and water for 8 minutes, stirring all the time. Add coconut and stir well. Put ½ the mixture on a dish. The remaining portion in saucepan add five or six drops of cochineal or vegetable coloring and stir well. Then put on top of white and cool. It is ready when to serve.
