LITHUANIAN ARMISTICE.
London, Nov. 30.—The League of Nations commission of control has arranged an armistice between Lithuania and Gen. Zellgouskie, the insurgent Polish commander at Vilna, according to a Kovno dispatch which reached London this evening. The armistice, the message states, is to go into effect today.

TURK PEACE TERMS. Paris, Nov. 30.—The peace terms offered the Republic of Armenia by Mustapha Kemal Pasha, the Turkish Nationalist leader, were announced this evening by the French foreign office. The terms are:

1. Armenia shall renounce its benefits under the Sevres Treaty.

2. Armenia shall adopt a friendly policy toward Turkey.

3. Turks living within the Republic of Armenia shall receive full protection.

SELF!SACRIFICE DAY IN ASSEMBLY

GENEVA, Nov. 30.—This was what might be called self-sacrifice day in the assembly of the League of Nations. Spain and other Spanish-speaking countries sacrificed their request that Spanish should be made one of the official languages; M. Viviani of the French delegation, withdrew an amendment in order to enable the assembly to reach a unanimous vote on the rules of procedure, while Viscount Ishii, head of the Japanese delegation, in a speech that commanded great attention, said that Japan would forego at this session the renewal of its demand that the league recognize the principle of equality of peoples regardless of race, nationality or religion. or religion.


