### TRUNK, FOUND, MAY THROW LIGHT ON SMALL CASE

TORONTO, Nov. 30.—A trunk mystery was woven into a story published in an evening paper of this city today in connection with the disappearance of Ambrose J. According to the story a heavy trunk was removed from a house in Toronto to the Union Station on the night of December 2 last by carters who had been called in for the purpose, and if this trunk could be located the mystery of Small's twelve months' absence might be solved. The paper states that it is not known what became of the trunk, from which emanated a sickening odor and which was left in the station baggage room.

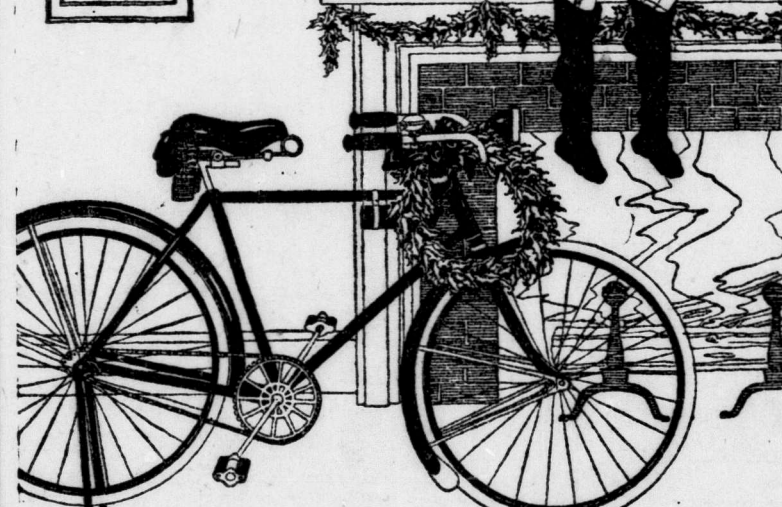
