PUZZLING OUT ROUTE TO AVOID CONGESTION

President Mackenzie in Conference With City Officials - Some Progress Made.

The conference on street railway lines, held in the mayor's office yesterday afternoon, didn't have any tangible results, but President Mackenzie promised to take up the Roncesvalles-avenue matter right away and to confer with Manager Fleming and City Engineer Rust about it and other lines. Those present for the city were Mayor Oliver, Controllers Spence and Hocken, Ald. McGhie and Whytock and City Engineer Rust. Mr. Mackenzie expressed surprise that the city owned this property and said that an overhead bridge was needed. Mr. Mackenzie suggested that the railway wished to bring all radial lines in, on such an arrangement that they could not be blocked at the expiration of the term of the franchise and the mayor said the city would be delighted to make reasonable terms. Mr. Mackenzie suggested that terms be made at that an independent tribunal settle them if they couldn't be otherwise reached.
