ALL HOLLAND REJOICES AT BIRTH OF PRINCESS



THE HAGUE, April 30.—Wilhelmina, Queen of the Netherlands, gave birth to a daughter this morning. The condition of her majesty is most satisfactory. The infant princess is doing well, and Holland is celebrating the happy event from one end of the country to the other, with expressions of joy and gratification such as seldom before have been witnessed on the part of this placid people.

gratification. The people read eagerly the special news sheets issued free by the newspapers announcing the happy event. Heralds accompanied by trumpeters led in ancient Dutch dress made the rounds of the city, halting at the principal squares and other suitable spots to make, after due fanfare, the following proclamation: "With great joy we announce the news that her majesty, by the grace of God, has been delivered of a princess."

SOUTHAMPTON, April 30.—Samuel Cairns, engineer of the Saugeen Electric Light and Power Co. of Southampton, and Andrew Ruxton of Chipewah Hill, were drowned in the Saugeen River, two miles east of here, this afternoon.

DAMAGE AT THE ISLAND

Forty-Five Cattle Burned.
SALEM, Ont., April 30.—The barn of John Barber, near here, was struck by lightning this morning at 2 o'clock, and burnt to the ground, together with forty-five head of cattle, six horses, and some sheep. The fire was so rapid that nothing was saved. A small insurance only was carried. Loss about \$3000.

TORNADOES IN SOUTH TAKE TOLL OF LIVES

Storm in Chicago Also Finds Half Dozen Victims—Damage in Michigan.

ATLANTA, Ga., April 30.—Between 28 and 30 persons dead in Tennessee, Mississippi and Arkansas and scores of injured were the toll last night of a series of tornadoes in those states.

Damage in Ohio.
PIQUET, Ohio, April 30.—A tornado swept over the past twenty miles wide, caused property damage in this region to-day estimated at \$100,000.

Six Killed in Chicago.
CHICAGO, April 30.—Six persons were killed and fifty injured in Chicago and environs during the storm last night, according to reports received by the police and coroner.

Tidal Wave.
DETROIT, April 30.—A tidal wave 10 feet high at South Haven on the east shore of Lake Michigan was the most unusual feature of the terrific wind and rainstorm which swept over Lake Michigan last night. The wave caused about \$2000 damage to waterfront property at South Haven.

Slaughter at Adana Told of by Eye-Witness
Missionary Who Saw Outbreak of Massacres Declares That Officials Were Cowardly.

The following account of the disorders at Adana is given by the Rev. Herbert Adams Gibbons, a missionary: "The entire vilayet of Adana has been visited during the past five days by a terrible massacre of Armenians, the worst ever known in the history of the district."

"Conditions have been unsettled for some time and there has been animosity between Turks and Armenians owing to the political activity of the latter and their open purchasing of arms."

"Early last Wednesday morning, while I was in the market, I noticed that the Armenians were closing their shops and hurrying to their homes. An Armenian and Turk had been killed during the night and the two corpses were paraded thru their respective quarters. The signs of the dead inflamed the inhabitants and crowds at once began to gather in the streets, armed with sticks, axes and knives. A few young Armenians assembled in the centre of the covered market and began firing revolver shots into the air. By 11 o'clock in the morning the crowd had begun to disperse."

"The military commander of Adana was by my side when the firing commenced and he tried to keep the crowd from dispersing the mob; he returned to his residence and did not venture out for two days."

"William Chambers, field secretary of the Young Men's Christian Association, and myself proceeded to the Konaik and found a howling mob demanding arms with which to kill the Glacours. We then went to the Turkish office to summon the British consul. On the steps of the building we saw three Armenians who had been massacred."

"While we were in the telegraph office a mob burst into the room where we were and killed two Armenians before our eyes. The unfortunate were supplicating the protection of the Vail when they were struck down."

"We managed to make our way into the next room, where we made representations to the Vail. The official said he could do nothing. He was afraid even of his own life and he made no attempt to protect us."

"Adana became a hell. The bazaars were looted and set on fire. There was continuous shooting and killing in every part of the town, and fires raged in many quarters."

"Mobs from the neighborhood began pouring into the city and notwithstanding our vehement protests, the Vail distributed arms to these men, alleging that they were Turkish reserves."

"On Friday the Armenians yielded, since when there has been little murdering."

Sons of Jove.
The regular meeting of the Jovian Lunch Club was held yesterday at noon with twenty-five members present. An interesting talk was given by E. D. Strickland, national organizer of the Sons of Jove. This organization is for the purpose of bringing together the members of electric trades into a closer acquaintance. The second rejuvenation, initiation and jovianity will be held at the assembly hall, Temple Building, to-night. It is expected that thirty candidates will be initiated.

Suggested Forest Reserve.
OTTAWA, April 30.—R. H. Campbell, superintendent of forestry, suggested to the committee on forests and waterways this morning that a belt of land from the Crow's Nest line to the international boundary, and from the British Columbia line fifty miles eastward should be reserved and the cut governed. There seems to be about twelve million acres available, he said.


