A CANADIAN NAVY

Hon, Mr. Brodeur Says So-Quebec ts Get Drydock Montreal Wanted.

MONTREAL, June 22 .- Montreal in to be sacrificed to Quebec as a port. In Montreal to the Chambre de Commerce Hon, Mr. Brodeur said that there was a question whether the drydock should be at Montreal or Quebec. The Canadian Government wishes to participate in the defence of the empire, but at the same time to safeguard its autonomy and the constrol of its contributions.
