#### LONG SEARCH FOR HIS FATHER

Russian Boy Set Out Years Ago—Succeeds in Canada.

NEW YORK, Aug. 27. The World to-day says: August Lindor, cashier for the Athens Hotel, has found his father after a search that lasted years and extended half way around the world. The father was a merchant in the Russian Government of Volynia, in the year 1886, possessed of property, a wife, a little boy and girl. One day the father disappeared, when August was two years old. Year after year the mother searched Europe for traces of her missing husband. When August was ten, he set out. In Austria, he was taken up by a traveling circus, and he made his way to London, where he sought a new home in New York.

August searched Scotland in vain and then sailed to New York to join his mother. He sold papers in the streets of New York and spent what he made in buying postage stamps to write to every postmaster of every country in the world. Last October he learned that his father was at Dorchester, Ont.

In 1897 the mother had died. August said last night that he found his father and family of two. His father besought him to stay and share in his business, but he refused.

#### GEO. MANVILLE FENN DEAD

One of the Best of Writers of Boys' Books.

LONDON, Aug. 27.—The death is announced here to-day of George Manville Fenn, the novelist. He was born in 1831.

Boys of the present, and thousands of men who were boys not so many years ago, will deplore the death of Manville Fenn. His books for juveniles were notable for the atmosphere of probability, his heroes acted and talked as real boys might do, and were not the paragons that most authors create. Neither did he have to go far afield for scenes of interest or daring-do, for many of his most absorbing tales finding their locale in good old Merrie England. He was a favorite contributor to "The Boys' Own Paper" and other such publications.

In fiction for the grown-ups he was also an adept in skilful delineation of character and originator of absorbing plot. Of recent years he was editor and proprietor of "Once a Week." His books and stories are counted by the score.
