Medical Superintendent of General Hospital Presents His Annual Report.

"In many cases what the patient needs instead of medicine is the services of a nurse who will visit the home to inquire if the patient is getting sufficient to eat, and instruct the family to prepare food or ventilate the house," says Dr. J. N. E. Brown, superintendent of the Toronto General Hospital, in his monthly report sent to the board of trustees of the hospital

"Patients require nursing care afleaving the hospital. Some provision in the near future ought to be made for the establishment of a social service department in connection with our hospital. A number of the larger hospitals in America have established such a department which would entail the services of a doctor, who would no doubt do the work free, Record average attendance at the

hospital is shown by the report. During March there was an average of 380,87 patients. The highest number in at one time was 397, and the lowest 367. Last March the average was only 337.55. There were 380 patients in on the last day of February; 416 were admitted, and 426 discharged during March, leaving 370 in on March 31. In the outdoor department 858 old cases, and 342 new cases received treatment, making the number treated 1210. Last March there were only

980 cases treated. The number of operations performed was 231, many more than ordinarily. There were 26 births and 37 deaths in the hospital. The nurse in charge of the tuberculosis clinic had 63 patients under instruction. Only two of them died. On April 1, a clinic on rables was given to the medical profession by the doctors in charge. 
