

The news from France of the surprising British progress in their new operations between the Scheldt and the Scarpe, and of the French joining in the onslaught against the Germans further south is the most important yet received from the western front since the battle of the Marne. The success, in its purely military aspect, is even greater and more damaging to the enemy than the success of the Marne. After their first day's advance the British renewed it yesterday afternoon, and soon the line of the Towns, Masnieres, Marcoing, Riberout, Havrincourt, Graincourt, Flesquieres was left well in the rear of the British forces. A touch of genius, mingled with audacity, is seen in the bold disconting of artillery preparation and the employment of tanks to destroy the German wire entanglements and other defences.
