HIS WISH TO RETURN

Chicago, Feb. 4.—Jack Johnson may get his wish and be permitted to return to the United States.

District Attorney Charles F. Clyne announced today; after receiving the letter mailed by the former world's champion in Mexico City last week, that he would enter into negotiations with Johnson.

The letter received by Mr. Clyne says:
"I am returning to Chicago in February, if I can get your approval. I wish to come via Cuba and New York, if you will arrange matters so I may come to Chicago without being molested en route. I am forced to ask you to give me thirty-six hours to arrange my security and other things which will be necessary.
