300 LADRONES LOOT TOWN LED BY 2 FAMOUS OUTLAWS

Four Hours of Fierce Fighting Against the Yankees Near Manila.

Manila, Jan. 25.—Additional details regarding the attack of ladrones on the town of San Francisco De Malabon last night, in which contract Surgeon J. A. O'Neill was killed, show that the ladrones numbered 200.

They were led by the famous outlaws Antonio and Polinario, who were aided by two American negroes. The ladrones were armed with 130 rifles, besides Surgeon O'Neill, one private of the constabulary was killed and three were seriously wounded. The home of former Governor Trias was attacked and his wife and two children abducted.

The municipal treasury was looted of \$300 and 25 Remington rifles taken by the ladrones. The rebels were dressed in constabulary uniforms and this fact created considerable confusion.

The scouts and the constabulary now have the town surrounded at the Puerto de Pura Damaz.

There was four hours of fierce fighting, the complete results of which have not yet been reported.

Mexico City, Jan. 25.—Dr. Liceaga, president of the superior board of health, states that as a result of the sanitary campaign initiated by the government against yellow fever, the fever has been practically wiped out, and there is not a single case now in the country.

Strike Due to Threats.

Kovno, Russia, Jan. 25.—The governor has issued a proclamation announcing that the general strike at Kovno has been brought about by the threats of a small group of workmen, who hope for changes in the factory regulations and an increase of wages can not, however, be obtained by such means.

MARTIN HANGS ON MARCH 10 JUDGE SOPS IN COURT ROOM

Sentence Gives No Hope of Reprieve Altho Counsel Will Make Effort to Secure Clemency.

Alexander Martin's doom was pronounced yesterday by Chief Justice Falconbridge. Unless the minister of justice revokes the sentence, Martin will be hanged on March 10.

The sentencing of the murderer was a sad, pathetic scene. It could not well be otherwise. A young man standing in the dock, listening to the timing of a death sentence, and convicted of one of the most cruel crimes that man or woman can be guilty of—the doing away with his young child.

In passing sentence, his lordship said: "I have no alternative but to pass sentence. Alexander Martin, it is not my practice, when I have the misfortune to be compelled to impose the sentence of death, to lecture the unfortunate criminal respecting the enormity of the crime which he has committed. If, during your imprisonment, you have any remorse, or if you have any desire to make amends for your crime, you may do so. After you have been found guilty, you were found guilty upon evidence, which, while circumstantial, left no doubt about your guilt. I implore you, Alexander Martin, for your own sake, not to entertain the slightest hope that the elements of the court will intervene, rather do I entreat that you seek the mercy which you on the third of August denied to that helpless infant, and my hope is that it be extended to you hereafter."

The prisoner took his sentence better than his conviction. At that time he came with emotion, his step was firm as he left the court. His father was present when sentence was given. Mr. Hasard had previously asked that the extreme penalty be not inflicted. His wife, too, was in such a condition that two lives might be sacrificed instead of one. A petition requesting clemency will be circulated and sent to Ottawa. Rev. Canon Baldwin is acting as Martin's spiritual adviser.

TWO FINED AT THE 300.

George Grant and Napoleon Audette Paid the Costs.

Sault Ste. Marie, Jan. 25.—There was only a short sitting of the judges trying the reported case this morning. The Canadian witnesses all being away voting. The only evidence of interest given was that of Michael Galvin, now of Sudbury, as to the negotiations with his brother, P. J. Galvin, for a gang of men to go to Michipicoten to kill Galvin said Kennedy had come over and asked for 100 or 200 men at first. P. J. Galvin said he was willing to get the men, but he would have nothing to do with the election of it.

Later, Kennedy came back and said Galvin \$250 to go ahead and get men. The same night he heard that J. P. T. Galvin, Galvin's partner in liquor business, was likely to give the plot away unless there was something in it for him. He was told it would be as good as a suit of clothes to him to keep his mouth shut. Afterwards, when the thing leaked out, Kennedy was very sore against T. Galvin and appeared to think he was the informer. The chancellor could not see that Coyne was at all implicated by the evidence.

Mr. DuVernet was allowed to read some admissions of P. J. Galvin in an affidavit, which also threw responsibility on to Kennedy.

Mr. Justice Trefzert thought Kennedy should have been questioned as to these statements. Instead of being an injured innocent, he was prime mover, according to Galvin, and his evidence gave the impression of a whitewash.

The Audette case was taken up. Robert McKay appearing for the accused. On a Broadway car last evening a passenger remarked that since the advent of the new manager the service suffered less interruption than under the former management. 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NEW RULER FOR ST. PETERSBURG.

Gen. Treppoff Becomes First Governor-General of the City.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 25.—The appointment of General Treppoff, the former chief of police in Moscow, to the governor-generalship of St. Petersburg was accompanied by an imperial decree announcing the creation of the post of governor-general. The incumbent of this office, the duke, states, will be in control of all the departments of administration of the city and government of St. Petersburg, with power to demand the assistance of the military and possessing all the rights of the minister of the interior over appointments to the municipal council and the zemstvos and also the right to forbid individuals to remain in the city. The decree, which is addressed to the senate, says: "Recent events have shown the necessity for the adoption of measures for the preservation of state institutions and public security adapted to the extraordinary circumstances of the time. On this account, we have considered it necessary to create the office of governor-general of St. Petersburg, on the basis of the provisions of the law prescribing the duties of chiefs and governors-general, and of the following regulations:

Control of the City.

First.—The city and government of St. Petersburg are placed under the authority of the governor-general.

Second.—In questions where the maintenance of state institutions and public security are at stake, all the local authorities and all the educational institutions are made subject to the governor-general.

Third.—The governor-general has the right to:
