FREDERICTON, N. B., May 17--(Special)--Rev. T. W. Street, sub-dean of the Cathedral will tomorrow celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of his ordination to the Christian ministry. He was ordained in this city by Bishop Medley, May 18th, 1856 and claims to be the oldest Anglican clergyman now in the diocese of Fredericton.

A SERIOUS BLAZE AT SUMMER RESORT Twenty-four Buildings Burned and \$60,000 Damage Done at Monument Beach.

MONUMENT BEACH, Mass., May 17--A fire which started at 11:30 last night from an unknown cause in the cottage of Arthur B. Marston, a summer resident, spread quickly on account of lack of a water supply and the instability of the water tank brigade to cope with it and an hour later, fourteen summer cottages and the passenger station of the N. Y. N. & Hartford R. R. had been burned. At that time the blaze was still in progress and there was a prospect that the whole settlement here early today and destroyed 24 cottages and the New York, New Haven & Hartford railroad station. The loss is estimated at \$60,000.

Its principal holding in Salt Lake, the Utah Light and Railway Company is to be taken over by a \$25,000,000 corporation composed of English and American capitalists. The new company will also acquire the Ogden street railway and build an electric line from Juab county, Utah, to Onego county, Idaho. It will be known as the Inter-Mountain Consolidated Railway Company and will be incorporated both in Utah and Idaho.

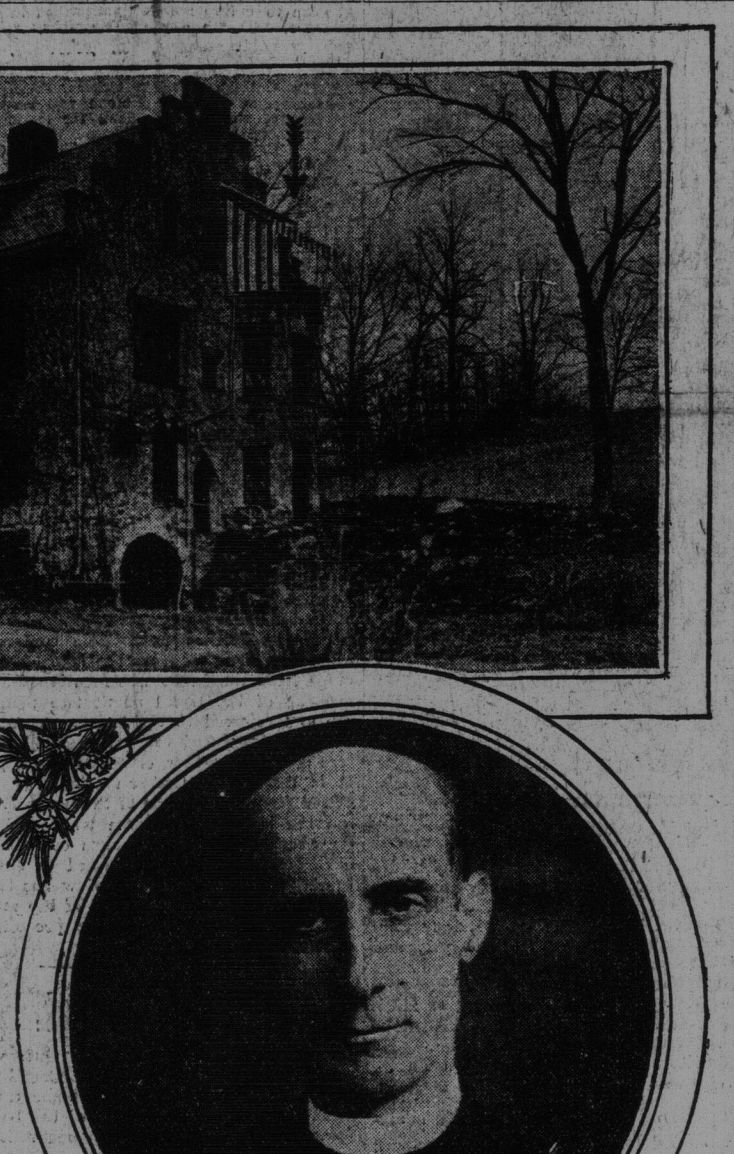

WASHINGTON, May 17--The world's internal commerce will aggregate fully \$27,000,000,000 in the year 1905, says a bulletin issued by the department of commerce and labor. By the term "world's internal commerce," explains the bulletin, is meant to be imports plus the exports of all countries of the world from which statistical reports were available. The figure given indicates that the trade between nations in 1905 will be six times as much as in 1850, two and a half times as much as in 1870, and 25 per cent. more than in 1900. An interesting fact, says the bulletin, which an examination of the figures of average monthly trade of the principal countries of the world develops is that the United States now stands at the head of the world's largest exporting nations. The average monthly exportation from the United States in the nine months ended with March, 1905, is shown by the bureau of statistics figures at \$147,208,973, the monthly average from the United Kingdom for the same period \$143,574,912, the average from Germany during the twelve months ended with December, 1905, \$110,777,800, and the monthly average from France for the twelve month period ended with February, 1905, \$72,520,400.
