




ATTEMPT TO BLOW-UP

Three Men, Said to be Germans, Arrested on Their Way Towards New Brunswick Border

New Harbor, Maine, Feb. 23-Thre e men, said to be Germans, charged with having attempted to blow up the railroad station of the C. P. R. at Brownville, have been arrested at Mattawamkeag, about thirty-five miles east of Brownville, according to a letter received here last night from a citizen of Winn, a town adjacent to Mattawamkeag.


The trio, the letter said, were disguised as tramps. A considerable quantity of dynamite and nitro-glycerine was found in their possession. The men were on their way eastward toward the New Brunswick line when arrested.




