RUSSIAN TROUBLE DUE TO GERMANY

Hun Officer, Captured Two Weeks Before, Told His Captors What Was Coming

CLEANING WATER MAINS

Preparations for commencing the work of cleaning the fifteen inch water main running from the Marsh bridge up Brussels street to Union were made this morning. The first run will be from the bridge to the foot of Brussels street, after which the cleaner is expected to proceed without interruption. The twelve and fifteen inch mains in the North End have been cleaned and the work in that section completed.

It has been found necessary to renew a sewer running across lots from Padlock to Cliff streets. The old timber structure will be replaced with cast iron under the buildings and terra cotta in other sections.

An eight-inch water main is being laid in Sheffield street to replace an old four-inch pipe.

BRITISH IGNORANT OF PERIL

Having rejoined the British armored car headquarters on the 17th, I left again for Stanilau on the afternoon of the 20th. Nothing then was known of the rupture at the front at a point only twenty miles distant on the previous morning, and the first report of it reached Commander Locker Lampson late on the 20th.
