ONE OF FIRST CONTINGENT

Letter From F. J. Carten of Fredericton to Lieut. Col. Guthrie—One Day at Front Worth Months of Hard Training

The following comes from a Fredericton soldier in a British Hospital:

Lieut. Colonel P. A. Guthrie, Fredericton, N. B.

Dear Sir:—Have just received your card with photograph this morning. Not at first recognizing the face, a certain amount of wonder was natural. After reading the outside the greatest pleasure succeeded. I wish to thank you very much and you may be sure that I shall never lose a mislayed picture. I have followed your career in the papers with a great

deal of interest always. And while in Montreal last spring looked forward to seeing you, while you were on your way to Ottawa. I was disappointed. It is with regret that I hear that you were wounded, how seriously I did not know until now.

I myself have received a rather nasty wound in the left arm, and until the last couple of weeks it looked as though I was going to be minus. I am glad to say that everything is coming along all right, although it will be some time before I can use the arm. I left the 18th R. H. C. to go in a draft with the 18th Battalion, R. H. C. You will know the latter battalion, and know the name they have. I was getting along fairly well, with them until a trench mortar of Fritz's and myself got into a row—well, I came out on a stretcher.

"Up the line" is a pretty lively place, isn't it? One thing particularly that struck me was the number of Fredericton men there. It is wonderful the number of men from home one sees, and dead indeed is the soul of any Fredericton man who does not feel a wonderful thrill of pride for the work the Canadian City has done and the number she has contributed.

I hear that you are "rising a new battalion, and trust that you are having the best of success. The men joining now are very lucky. They are under officers who have been at the front and who know what's what. Canada has sent a lot of men but there should be no trouble in getting as many again. If the men only could understand what the First Division went through. Just to think of taking part in the most wonderful war that the world has ever seen! One day at the front is well worth the months of hard training.

And who can ever forget the picture of a heavy bombardment and attack on a dark night? It is an awful business, but splendid in its awfulness.

I wish to thank you for your good wishes. Trusting that it won't be very long before I can get back to the "line" again, and wishing you every success in the future, a success which you so well deserve, I am,

LOCAL NEWS

The members of the West Side Soldiers' Comfort Association gave a dinner and dance in honor of the officers and men of the 68th Home Guard, last night as a mark of appreciation on the part of the members to the soldiers who so kindly acted as guards during their recent patriotic fair.

Frank Mahoney, of East St. John, while going about his duties at the round house last night, met with an accident when he fell from the turntable into the table circle and strained one leg quite badly. The young man was taken in the ambulance to his home where he will be confined for some days.

A highly interesting description of the Quebec Bridge disaster has been received by John Flood, contractor, of this city, from his son, John, who is employed as an engineer at the St. Lawrence ship canal. The boat on which he was proceeding was the nearest to the bridge when it collapsed and it was rushed to the scene of the tragedy and assisted in the rescue work. He, himself, said in bringing one man, named McCann, out of the water.

Lieut. Colonel J. L. McAvity, O. C. of the 28th New Brunswick Battalion, has in his possession a list of the names of men who were buried in the 28th burying ground at Waterloo, Belgium. The list contains the names of two officers and thirty-five men. Colonel McAvity also has a picture of the cemetery, which he is having copied, and he will send one of each, together with a copy of the list, to the next of kin of each man who has found a final resting place in this cemetery.


