Williams Fooled Erie
St. Paul (Minn.), Sept. 10.—Johnny Erie, of St. Paul, was fooled by "Kid" Williams, of Baltimore, world's champion bantam-weight in the fifth round of their scheduled, an round no-decision fight here tonight.

BASEBALL TO HAVE PEACE NEXT YEAR

Agreement Reached, According to Report From Philadelphia

A Philadelphia despatch says: A peace agreement has been reached by organized baseball and the Federal League and the "outlaw" organization will open the 1916 season as the third major league, under the protection of the National Commission, according to information obtained here today from authentic sources. In reaching the agreement, all the details of which will be completed at the end of the present season, the Federals were compelled to withdraw their teams from Chicago and St. Louis and give up their plan to invade New York.

These arrangements were made at a recent meeting of representatives of the warring factions at the Hotel Biltmore in New York city, and the agreement was signed by representatives authorized by the officials of each league. The National and American League officials will remain just as they are, but each major league city in organized baseball will have a Federal league franchise, and two teams will be placed in another city. Just how the Baltimore and Newark Federal league franchises will be taken care of has not been decided, but all other arrangements have been perfected.

The most difficult problem that confronted the peace delegates was inducing the Federal League to withdraw from Chicago. Owner P. S. Power insisted that Chicago was capable of taking care of three teams, but he was persuaded to allow franchises without transferred to Detroit. Whether he will sell out his holdings and be allowed to buy again in the Cubs is not known, but it is certain he will not be owner of the Detroit Federal League franchise.

Phil Ball was willing to give up St. Louis for a block of stock in the Cardinals or Browns, but the Federal officials will be transferred to Washington, which has only one major league team. Both Ed and Wynnman wanted peace, but neither wanted to have his franchise moved.

In accomplishing this the organized ball force secured a diplomatic victory, as it was freely predicted that there never could be peace with three clubs in St. Louis and Chicago, and the Federals had always maintained that they would give up these cities.
