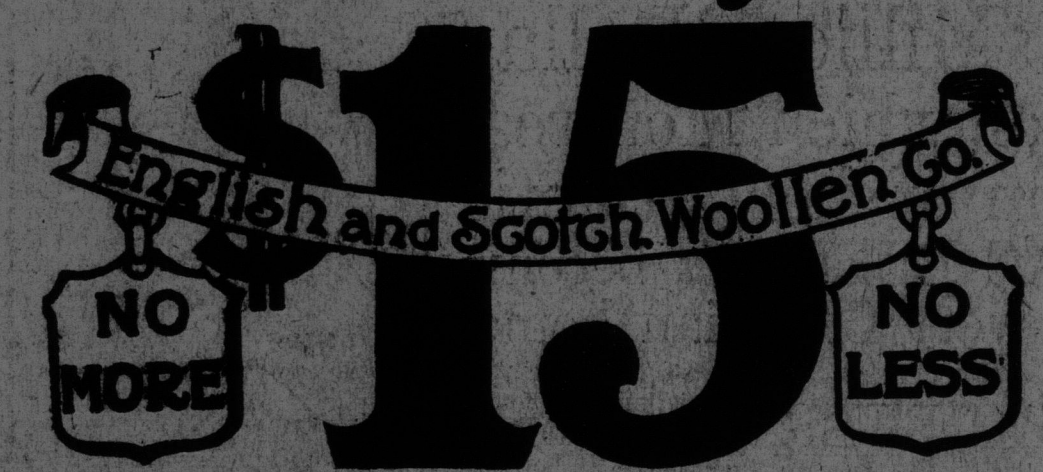

Latest Suggestion of House Committee

THOSE PATRIOTIC POTATOES

Mr. Murray Again Avoids Opportunity to Give Information—Will Not Protrude This Week

Fredericton, N. B., April 23.—It is generally conceded now that the business of the legislature will not be finished this week. Some of those who are closest to the government make the statement that it will require the greater part of next week for the consideration of the measures already before the house, and those to be submitted.

There is some doubt as to whether there will be any further railway legislation, and yet the necessity of it, according to those who are keenly interested in the settlement of the railway's affairs, is very real. So far there has been no explanation at length from any number of the government in the house as to the affairs of the railway, or what is to be the policy with regard to its completion. There have been many rumors as to the cancellation of the contracts with the St. John & Quebec Railway Company, and Mr. Gould and his associates, but in order to do this it would be necessary to have legislation.

Many Defects in Road. While the railway is being operated under a temporary agreement by the Intercolonial, the delay in taking over the railway, as intended in the original arrangement, is likely to be prolonged. It is openly stated by the section men on the road that many defects are showing up very plainly this spring in connection with the construction of the railway; that the foundations of the water tanks are not what they should have been; that the culverts are breaking down and many other defects are showing up. All this will entail much additional expense for repairs and it will be in the interests of the province to have the railway taken over as soon as possible. Within the last few days a force of men has been sent out to clear out some of the ditches that have filled up and to do other repair work that is needed immediately. The province, of course, must foot the bill, and what the end of all this will be it is not easy to determine.

Hours for Closing Bars. There seem to have been some representations made to the government which have altered the hours of closing intended in the original amendment to the liquor license act. Yesterday the closing hours were to be 7 o'clock every evening, except Saturday, when the bars were to close at noon. Today the hours are stated to be from 8 to 8 every day except Saturday, when the closing hour will be 6 o'clock instead of 7 o'clock, as at present. These changes are the result of a vigorous lobby on the part of the liquor interests, who have several young lawyers on the spot here all the time.

Those Patriotic Potatoes. There have been many surprising answers given to inquiries by the opposition during this session, but that made today by the minister of agriculture to an inquiry asking what was the nature of the financial arrangements made by Mr. Daggett and the Bank of Nova Scotia in connection with the purchase of the potatoes for the patriotic gift and the details of any arrangements made by him with the Bank of Nova Scotia are not at present available, but will be ascertained on his recovery and return to the department. Surely the business of the agricultural department is not carried on in this way. The arrangement with the bank for the disposition of more than 100,000 must have been approved and known to the minister himself. If Mr. Murray did not know anything about it he is not fit for agriculture. Mr. Daggett must have extraordinary powers. The correspondence in connection with such a transaction would surely not be carried around in Mr. Daggett's pocket, but must be on file in the department and would tell the story. But apparently the story is not to be told, for every power of evasion has been used to keep the facts from the public.

More Pertinent Queries. Some other questions were asked by Mr. Dugal a day or two ago with respect to this matter, and an answer is expected later. He inquired:

1. Was Leslie Slipp employed as inspector, or in any other capacity, by the department of agriculture, in connection with the receipt and disposal of the potatoes purchased by the government for the patriotic and Belgian gifts?
2. Did not Mr. Slipp protest concerning the condition of very many of the potatoes on their arrival at West St. John, and did he not condemn many cars of the same as unfit for shipment?
3. Were not his objections and rulings strongly resisted by A. C. Smith & Co. and S. P. Smith or either of them, and others, and did not Secretary of Agriculture Daggett overrule the inspector's condemnation and accept the rejected potatoes?
4. Were not the potatoes shipped by S. P. Smith or any one else paid for before they were inspected at the West Side?

A full answer to these questions might be interesting.

Bills Introduced.
