## THINKS SLAYER CRAZED WITH RAGE

Halifax Detective Centres  
Berry Inquiry in  
Guinea

Kennedy Questioning All  
Inhabitants as to Move-  
ments Before and After  
Time of Murder—The  
Tramp, Said to Have Been  
from St. John, is Found  
Dead.

Clementsport, N. S., Oct. 27.—Official investigation into the murder of Thomas Berry, an aged farmer, last week, after going ahead for a few days to surrounding districts has centred itself in Guinea. Chief Detective Kennedy of Halifax is calling upon each of the inhabitants of that district to account for his or her movements several days before and after the crime. The detective puts little faith in the theory that the crime was committed by a wandering tramp and also minimizes the idea that robbery was the motive. He said last night that the murder seemed to have been committed by some one crazed with rage. The body looked, he said, as though it had been brutally beaten after death. He said the case was the most baffling one he had even been called upon to investigate.

There has been a persistent rumor through the countryside that there is a man missing from the small community. Who he is, white or colored, married or single, where he has gone, how long he has been absent, no clue yet will tell, for no one evidently desires to throw a man under suspicion, when, perhaps, after all, that man is innocent. But the rumor persists just the same.

### Stranger Found Dead.

The man who Mrs. Andrews of North Range, near Digby, fed on Saturday, and whom she reported to the authorities on Monday as being a suspicious character, was found dead by children in an outbuilding of a school, at North Weymouth on Tuesday. That avenue, if any to the solution of the Berry murder, is closed. Detective Kennedy could find nothing upon him that would identify him in any way with the crime at Guinea. One story is that the tramp had said he had come from St. John.

Mrs. Leander Guy, wife of the negro who first found the body of Thomas Berry lying on the kitchen floor, now says that she heard "chopping of wood" in the Berry yard early on Thursday evening, and after dark. Mrs. Guy

naturally attributes that chopping of wood to Thomas Berry—is it possible that what Mrs. Guy heard was the noise of Mr. Berry being done to death by the murderer?

In the meantime the people of Guinea are still going about with hushed breath. And underneath their hushed demeanor there is the terrible fear that the murderer lives among them, or was one of themselves.

## MENTAL TROUBLE IS BIG PROBLEM

Government Urged to Pro-  
vide Institution for Feeble  
Minded.

"There are more beds in this country for people who are mentally sick than for those sick from all other causes," declared Dr. Gordon S. Mundle, of the Canadian National Committee for Mental Hygiene, in his address on "Mental Hygiene," given recently at the Child Welfare Exhibit, Montreal. He added that the machinery at present at their disposal was inadequate to cope with the situation and that the government of Quebec was being asked to assist them in getting more complete equipment.

In commencing, Dr. Mundle explained briefly what was meant by the term "mental hygiene" and stated that it was only within the past few years that the treating of those mentally ill had been made a scientific study. Insanity, he said, in a large number of cases was curable if taken in the earlier stages, and while complete cures were impossible, much could be done for the feeble-minded. They were trying to induce the government to provide an institution for these unfortunate. Some people said "Let them die off, or kill them by some humane method," but that was impossible; they must be cared for and it was the duty of the government to provide such care. The speaker emphasized the fact that the committee had a wide scope. They were interested in the juvenile delinquent, feeling there was a reason for every girl brought before the court. They also took an interest in the young man or woman, a stranger in the city, who began to brood, grew depressed and finally, if help was not forthcoming, perhaps ended in being sent away to an asylum. They were behind the "big sister" movement, providing a "big sister" for all girls who were tending to go downwards. They hoped to also provide "big brothers" for boys. Turning to the subject of immigration, Dr. Mundle said they were urging the government to institute a more strict mental examination. Another need was the organization of public school classes for sub-normal children. Other large cities in Canada had these, but so far Montreal had made no provision for this class of pupil.

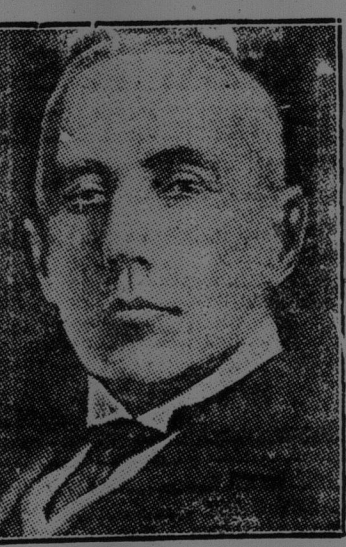
British Gentry Taking More Active  
Interest in Holdings.

The Prince of Wales has recently made some discriminating purchases of stock for his farm in Devon and Cornwall. These include both rams and ewes of the Kerry Hill (Wales) breed of sheep, of which he is establishing a flock, and some shorthorn cattle, one for which he paid £200.

The close, practical interest which of the latter being a yearling heifer the Prince is taking in the development of his farm estates is having an excellent effect on British agriculture, practically in its incentive to young men who will one day succeed to great estates to make themselves thoroughly efficient in their management. At present the great landowners are engaging more actively in agricultural affairs than for long past. The ever-increasing difficulties and obligations of land ownership demand it, and a notable sign of the times is the number of eldest sons of territorial lords who are assuming the practical direction of the home farm and of the agricultural interests in general connected with the family property.
