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JOHN BRACKEN NAMED BY MANITOBA FARMERS TO BE NEW PREMIER

Winnipeg, July 21-John Bracken, aged thirty-nine, a native of Ontario, graduate of the Guelph Agricultural College, is to be the next premier of Manitoba. He was the choice, unanimously, it is understood, of the United Farmer nembers-elect of the legislature as their political leader and that post carries with it automatically succession to Hon, T. C. Norris as prime minister. Announcement of his selection and acceptance was made at 6 o'clock tonight by C. Barclay, member-elect for Springfield, who was chairman of the conference.


