Assembly at its recent meeting in Winnipeg.
"Conscious that in all parts of the earth the old order is breaking up," the manifesto states, "facing everywhere chaotic conditions of human society and uncertainty as to what the future has in store; recognizing anew the interdependence of all nations and the impossibility of any one nation working out its own salvation while other nations are suspicious and hateful; convinced that the one hope for a better world or any Kingdom of God on earth lies in the spirit and ministry of Jesus manifested in all lands as a present-day reality; assured that in Canada and in all foreign fields there is more than ever before a consciousness of need, a groping in the dark for some way out, a wistful looking to the church for help that cannot be found elsewhere, we summon one another and our whole membership to a deeper study of Our Lord's Incarnation and Passion and a more adequate continuance of our Lord's ministry among men."
A series of practical suggestions follow this challenge—that conferences of presbyteries, ministers and other groups, as well as congregations as a whole, frequently held for the study of this Forward Movement call, reviewing conditions and needs in congregations and communities and involving a study of Canadian and world-wide needs and the cultivation of the sense of stewardship, both of life and substance. Other conferences with Sunday school and young people's leaders, missionary workers and others are also suggested. As an aid in the deepening of the spiritual life, Rev. Dr. George A. Fidgeon had prepared a series of lessons in the Gospel of Luke on the mind and ministry of Christ, to run through the coming autumn and winter.
It is expected that the complete programme will culminate not only in a great in-gathering at the Easter communion season, but in an impetus to the training of leaders for life services, both voluntary and full time.
The message covering the above outline has been sent to all Presbyterian ministers in Canada, signed by the Moderator, Rev. W. J. Clark, and Principal Gandler, so that ample preparations may be made for inaugurating the fifth-year campaign in the coming fall.

JOHN BRACKEN NAMED
BY MANITOBA FARMERS
TO BE NEW PREMIER

Winnipeg, July 21—John Bracken, aged thirty-nine, a native of Ontario, graduate of the Guelph Agricultural College, is to be the next premier of Manitoba. He was the choice, unanimously, of the United Farmers members-elect of the legislature and that post carries with it automatically succession to Hon. T. C. Norris as prime minister. Announcement of his selection and acceptance was made at 6 o'clock tonight by C. Barclay, member-elect for Springfield, who was chairman of the conference.

Bracken's Career.
The new premier-elect of Manitoba, John Bracken, B. S. A., is only thirty-nine years of age. He is a Canadian by birth and education, and comes of generations of farming stock. He was born and raised on a large dairy farm in the county of Leeds, Ontario, and while he was still in his teens, became mayor of the county. For four years of farm management, Mr. Bracken took the B. S. A. course at Ontario Agricultural College and graduated with honors, taking three scholarships and one proficiency medal.

Very shortly after graduation Mr. Bracken came to Manitoba as representative of the dominion seed branch and did excellent work in stimulating interest in the production of better seed. On the formation of the province of Saskatchewan in 1905 he was invited to take the superintendence of institutes and farms and later two years combined with that work the position of livestock commissioner. When the University of Saskatchewan was opened he accepted the professorship of field husbandry having supplemented his work at Guelph and his practical training with a year of post-graduate work in United States and Ontario. In 1920, Mr. Bracken was the unanimous choice of the board of directors of the Manitoba Agricultural College to fill the position of president.

Mr. Bracken married Alice Wylie Bruce, of Guelph, and has four sons.

M. B. SENATOR
CHANGES OPINION
OF PROGRESSIVES

Winnipeg, July 21—Senator J. A. McDonald, of Shediac (N. B.), interviewed here today following his arrival in Ottawa on route to Toronto, declared he had changed his idea of the Progressives, whom, before his western tour, he had considered a selfish band. The senator said he had so changed his mind he now wanted to get at the reason why the agricultural producer was not getting a fair price for what he had to sell. The discrepancy between costs of production and selling price was such as would bear investigation. He said he hoped to do all in his power to erase the ill-feeling between the east and the west.

Senator McDonald, during his trip, has been investigating the railway problem which he characterized as one of the most important problems facing Canada at the present time.

PUTTING \$250,000
IN NEW BUILDINGS
(Sussex Record).
It is estimated that at the present time, in Sussex and vicinity, there are a quarter of a million dollars' worth of new buildings in sight under way, with a number of residences in prospect. Beside the work that is being carried on at present, it is very probable that a number of new residences will be under course of construction in the near future. The town of Sussex has been allotted thirty thousand dollars by the government to be expended in the "Housing Scheme," and the Town Council is asking for applications from those who desire to take advantage of the "Housing Act" to provide themselves with a home of their own. The largest contract under way is that of the new school building, which is being erected to replace the one destroyed by fire. All the foundation work has been completed and the carpenters are now busy at work putting up timbers. The brick and stone masons are beginning to get busy and in a few weeks a great change will be noticeable, as the contractors, the Rhodes, Curry Co., Ltd., intend pushing the work to an early completion. It is expected that the new school building will be ready for occupancy by December first. The new building, when completed and equipped, will cost in the vicinity of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and will be one of the finest educational buildings in the maritime provinces. A number of private residences are under course of construction.

PUBLIC HEALTH.
(Moncton Transcript).
The St. John Times, a paper, which has done much to promote sound thinking on social reform and public health questions, calls attention to the statement of C. E. Turner, assistant professor of biology and public health in the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, that probably the greatest opportunity for saving lives in the next few decades will be found in health education. It is an unfortunate fact that in many parts of Canada the death rate is higher than it ought to be, some of the cities having an unenviable record in the matter of infant mortality. Medical science says that more careful attention to public health would prevent much of the disease which now causes untimely deaths and makes life a burden to many. Much can be accomplished by training children in habits of healthy living and promoting a more general interest in public hygiene. The problem has other sides, however. Improvements in housing conditions and also in the working conditions of the people are necessary to assure the desired improvement in the general health of the people.
