### BUSINESS CONFIDENCE

Confidence is returning slowly but surely, according to Bradstreet's Toronto letter. Dry goods are moving more freely, clothing is still slow, although the situation is more favorable than it was two months ago. "Manufacturing operations are also showing greater life, especially at many of the larger factories. Financial difficulties are holding back others, however. Boots and shoes are selling on a better scale than before the holidays. Rather significant is the fact that the statement of the manager of a large retail store in Toronto who says that, not only is business good, but the people are showing a strong desire for quality goods. In fact, it is claimed that if they cannot get what they want in the way of good materials, they will not buy, rather than take anything inferior. The iron and steel markets conditions are regarded as favorable, and all comments are optimistic. The leather business is brighter, and dealers say that there is a better demand coming for standard lines of less leather. Groceries are moving steadily, and the sugar market is now on a stable basis, with wholesale prices to the retailers at \$10.71 per 100-pound bag. Hardware is in moderate demand, with many price revisions downward. The steel of Arctic weather has been helpful to retail sales of seasonable heavy wear."

Chicago, Jan. 27.—Indictments charging violation of the Sherman anti-trust law against thirty-one officials of the Poster Advertising Company of Chicago and one Canadian mentioned. The company is charged with having "worked together" to obtain leases on all suitable bill boards in towns in which the population is more than 2,500. They operate through the United States and in Canada. It is alleged that the companies used "unfair and unlawful methods" in excluding competitors. One director of the Poster Advertising Association, mentioned in the indictment is Edward L. Ruddy of Toronto.

## MORE BIRTHS AND FEWER DEATHS

Vital Statistics Reported for England and Wales—Infant Mortality Also Lower. London, Jan. 27.—Several records are being by the figures given in the registrar-general's provisional returns for 1920. Births per thousand of population in England and Wales were 25.44 and in London 29.2. Deaths were 12.4 per thousand in England and Wales, and the same in London. Infant mortality per thousand was 10.4 in England and Wales, and 7.8 in London. The birth rate for 1920 is the highest of the decade, and the number of births the highest ever recorded. The death rate is the lowest recorded and the number of deaths the lowest recorded since 1902, when the population was only twenty million. The infant mortality rate (under one year), is the lowest ever recorded.

WATCHING WAGES PAID TO WOMEN  
Regulations of Board in Ontario Adopted by Government.  
Toronto, Jan. 26.—Regulations drafted by the minimum wage board of Ontario have recently been adopted by the government. The regulations are designed to guide the payment of wages to women in the textile industry. There are two exceptions among women workers coming under the board's supervision and they are farm laborers and house servants. The regulations require all employers of female labor to keep a complete record of the names of workers and wages paid, such records to be open at all times to inspection by agents of the board. Special permission may be granted for the payment of lower wages than the standard minimum in the case of handicapped workers, part time workers, apprentices, etc. The first task of the board will be to investigate the wage rates for women in laundries.

## DIRECT ACTION IS HEARD OF AT LABOR PARTY CONFERENCE

London, Jan. 27.—The question of direct action by British labor in connection with the unemployment situation was brought to the fore today at a national conference of the Labor party and the trade union congress here. J. H. Thomas, secretary of the National Union of Railwaymen, said that if the government failed to accept the proposals of labor the question of direct action would be discussed and a decision regarding it reached on February 23.

## WILL NOT DELAY HOUSE OPENING

Smallpox Situation in Ottawa Quebec's Proposed Embargo.

(Special to The Times.) Ottawa, Jan. 27.—Reports that the opening of parliament would be postponed on account of the epidemic of smallpox in Ottawa are unfounded. There are 125 cases now in the city, all of a mild type. It is practically certain, however, that the Province of Quebec will place an embargo on all travellers from Ottawa except those vaccinated. This will mean that many of our legislators will spend their first week after February 14 with very sore arms, as a vaccination certificate will be the only passport recognized by board of health officials of the sister province.

Montreal, Que., Jan. 27.—Opium thieves made another raid on the court house here and got away with a pound of the crude article held as evidence in a case in the police magistrate's court.

## SAYS WRECK STORY WAS SAILOR'S YARN.

Manila, P. I., Jan. 27.—Reports of the wreck of the British steamer Isabela on the Island of San Pulan, on January 21, were inventions of two United States deserters of the crew of the vessel according to reports to Governor Harrison from the governor of Samar. He said investigation revealed that Robert and Mack Malone, found on Tarnate Island, had spread the report in hopes of gaining aid.

## BRITISH MINERS SEE THAT REDUCTION IN WAGES MUST COME.

London, Jan. 27.—Many delegates to the national conference of the miners' federation in session here admitted yesterday that reduction of wages will be inevitable. The object of the session is to consider the attitude to be taken towards the labor conference on unemployment.

## FROST-BITTEN CONGERS

London, Jan. 27.—The prolonged frost had a curious effect upon the fish in the channel, and at least a number of dead fish were discovered by boatmen on the beach. They comprised large congers, cod, whiting, sprat and others. Most of the fish were frost-bitten, especially the congers which are susceptible to frost.
