THE PREMIER AND DE VALERA

Reports of Week End Conference Circulated.

No Definite Word Given Out at Downing Street—Wild Scenes in Dublin Last Evening—Other Irish News.

London, May 30.—Downing street, the official residence of Premier Lloyd George, has been inundated with reports for confirmation or denial of reports from Belfast that De Valera and Lloyd George had held a conference but definite yes or no to this question is being withheld.

Brothers Killed.

Cork, May 30.—Two brothers named Fitzgerald, one a railwayman and the other a farmer, were taken from their home yesterday and shot. Their bodies were riddled with bullets.

Belfast, May 30.—A party of Ulster special policemen were fired on yesterday in a hedge five miles outside Tyrone. Constable Robert Coakley was instantly killed, and an old man with whom he was speaking was wounded and killed later. Another man also was wounded. The members of the attacking force were in Dublin.

Dublin, May 30.—Wild scenes were witnessed here last evening a little before the curfew hour. Stone throwing and other disturbances were witnessed in the streets of the city, and a riot broke out in the vicinity of O'Connell street and at the O'Connell bridge.
