MILLERAND TO BE ELECTED TODAY

Personnel of New French Ministry Likely Announced Tomorrow.

Paris, Sept. 23.—Members of the French senate in chamber of deputies convened in national assembly at Versailles today to elect a president.

The name of Alexandre Millerand, who since last February has been premier and minister of foreign affairs, was the only one to be presented formally and the meeting was looked upon as merely a formality.

Immediate inauguration of the new president was decided upon by government officials. This was considered necessary as the republic for two days has been without an official head.

Millerand's resignation was formally accepted on Tuesday and in the interim governmental responsibilities were carried by the cabinet. It is expected the personnel of the new ministry will be announced tomorrow.

SAYS PROHIBITION DRIVES HIM AWAY

New York Art Dealer Goes to Paris to Live—Declares There Will Be Change.

Newport, R. I., Sept. 23.—"I am driven out of the United States by prohibition," declared A. J. Audrain, senior member of A. J. Audrain and Company, dealer in art, who yesterday afternoon sold his summer residence here, which he has occupied for fourteen years. He will leave for Paris to reside. He will return, he says, "when the American people regain common sense, which will be in about six years."

A STRONG TICKET FOR CHARLOTTE

Messrs. Scovil, Mann, Kennedy and Lawrence to Carry Government Standard.

St. Stephen, Sept. 22.—Four strong and popular men were chosen for the convention here today. They are John W. Scovil of St. Stephen, Harry W. Mann of St. Stephen, Frank Kennedy of St. Andrews and Hugh R. Lawrence of St. George. There was a large attendance at the convention from every part of the Charlotte county. The outlook for a government victory in this constituency is very bright, due to the impression made on the public by the progressive administration of the Foster government. There is a strong feeling among many of those in Charlotte county who have not previously been supporters of Hon. Mr. Foster's party that the government of which he is the head should be continued in office and enabled to carry out the policies which are doing so much to advance the interests of the people.

Geo. S. Byron of St. Andrews was the chairman of the meeting and in a few opening remarks expressed pleasure in presiding over such a large gathering. David Mann, St. Stephen; Brooks Winchester, Grand Manan; Will Holt, St. Andrews and Walter Lynott, St. George, were appointed a nominating committee and brought in the names of John W. Scovil and Harry W. Mann of St. Stephen, Frank Kennedy of St. Andrews and H. R. Lawrence of St. George as candidates to represent the government in the coming election. Each of the men selected gave stirring addresses expressing the belief that Charlotte county, which had formerly been opposition, would in this election be strong supporters of the good policies of the local government. Other speakers were B. M. Hill, chief road engineer; J. B. Macdonald, St. Stephen; and Dr. D. S. St. Stephen.

John W. Scovil of St. Stephen, one of the provincial government candidates nominated yesterday in Charlotte county, was formerly a resident of St. John, where he leased a large retail house. After removing to St. Stephen he went into business on his own account.

Mr. Scovil was born in Scotland about fifty years ago, the son of the late Henry Augustus Scovil. His mother was a sister of the late Sir Albert J. Smith, for many years Liberal member of parliament for Westmorland and a member of the Mackenzie cabinet. He is a first cousin of Hon. Dr. E. A. Smith, formerly minister of lands and mines.

SOME TORONTO MEN PREDICT LOWER PRICES

Clothing Outlook for Spring, Though They Say English Woollens Will Not Drop.

Toronto, Sept. 23.—Clothing prices will come down next spring according to several clothiers in this city, although they say the price of English woollens will not drop. One prominent clothier yesterday declared that while his profits never had been smaller than at present he would reduce his price because he had a large stock of clothing and had to dispose of it. Another attributed the cause for the prospective lowering in price to the fact that the public had rebelled against the high price.

PRINCE RETURNS TO PORT OF SPAIN

Port of Spain, Sept. 23.—The Prince of Wales, who has been visiting Georgetown, British Guiana, is expected to return here this morning, and will spend the day and evening ashore. He will leave on Friday morning for St. George, the seat of the government of the Windward Islands colony.

Since his arrival here the prince has been very active. He has visited the principal industries, and has played golf and tennis as relaxed as he can. He attended divine service and later visited soldiers stationed here, chatting freely with the men. His democratic attitude has been very pleasing to the people, with whom he has conversed on many occasions. Dinners are being given members of the British Empire League, which is returning with the prince from Australia and New Zealand.

BOSTON GIRL ENGAGED TO RUSSIAN NOBLEMAN.

Miss Clara P. Curtis Will Wed Prince of Russia, Grand-Grandson of President U. S. Grant.

Nahant, Sept. 23.—The engagement of Miss Clara P. Curtis, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Pelham Curtis of 447 Beacon street, to Prince Michael Cantacuzene, who is also Count Speransky, a Russian nobleman, was announced at a reception held at the Curtis summer residence at Pelton Lake, Nahant, last night.

Miss Curtis made her debut in the winter of 1917 at a ball given in her honor by Mrs. William Lindsey, at which time several other Boston young women were introduced. She is a member of the Chilton Club. An older brother, Thomas J. Curtis, is a sophomore at Harvard, and a younger brother, Herbert Pelham Curtis, is captain of the football team at St. Mark's school.

Prince Cantacuzene is a son of Prince and Princess Cantacuzene (Julia Grant) of Russia. The young couple met about two years ago when the prince entered Harvard, his family coming from Russia.

His grandfather is Fred. Grant and his great-grandfather is General U. S. Grant, ex-president of the United States. His family has been living in New York, where his mother has been in charge of a committee for Russian relief. He has two sisters, the Princess Bertha and the Princess Ida.

No date has been set for the wedding.

RUTHENIAN BISHOP SEEKS NATURALIZATION

Winnipeg, Sept. 23.—Right Rev. Nicetas Budka, Bishop of the Ruthenian Catholics in western Canada, made application yesterday in court before Mr. Justice Curran for naturalization. The case was referred to the secretary of state on the question of nationality. Bishop Budka said he was confident the secretary of state would grant the naturalization.

UNITED FARMERS' CONVENTION ON SEPTEMBER 28

Fredericton, Sept. 22.—The convention of the United Farmers organization in York County advertised for today at the county court house did not materialize. There was a gathering there this afternoon, some being from the city and expecting to witness nomination proceedings but it was announced that there had been a misunderstanding and the meeting was merely an executive meeting and not a nomination convention. Douglas Clarkson of Nashwan, president of the county organization was chairman and Clarence Goodspeed was appointed secretary pro tem.

The announcement was made that the U. F. convention for York for the purpose of nominating candidates would be held in Fredericton on Tuesday, Sept. 28.

ARMED GUARDS INCREASED ON ROCKEFELLER ESTATE.

A dozen extra guards, bringing the total number to forty, have been placed on duty in and about John D. Rockefeller's Pocantico Hills estate since the newspaper published a report that this added precaution was taken because Mr. Rockefeller, who is now on the estate, had received a threatening letter, but no confirmation of this could be got.

The guards are patrolling the County House Road, the Bedford Road and both inside and outside the stone walls on either side of a mile and one-half of the tracks of the Putnam division of the New York Central Railroad, which run through the estate.

Automobiles have seen the men on the roads outside the estate as late as 10:30 o'clock at night. Contrary to the usual custom, the guards in the daytime are armed with repeating rifles. Access to the grounds is unusually difficult, and any one who does gain entrance can progress but a few feet beyond a gateway before he finds himself accosted by two of the armed men.
