PRIZE CATTLE.

TO NINETY FOR

The country market was not particularly well supplied with poultry this morning and high prices ruled for what was offered. More plentiful stocks were expected upon the arrival of the Sussex train which had a breakdown near Brookville and was about an hour and a half late. Turkeys were not abundant, but it is the opinion of dealers that they are not at all scarce through the country and that in the few days before Christmas there will be plenty of them, though prices will continue firm. From seventy-five to ninety cents a pound was being asked for them, while sixty and sixty-five cents was the price on geese. Prices on other articles were about as follows: Chickens, from fifty to sixty cents; fowl, thirty-five to forty cents; ducks, sixty to sixty-five cents; beef, twenty to forty cents; pork, thirty-five to forty cents; lamb, twenty-five to thirty-five cents; lamb, twenty-five to thirty-five cents; lamb, twenty-five to thirty-five cents; leggs, seventy-five to ninety cents a dozen; butter, sixty-five cents a pound. 
