### THE RING.

Madden Defeats Brennan.

Flooding along against Bill Brennan of Chicago and a fifteen pounds weight handicap, Bartley Madden, a New York heavyweight, gained the popular verdict over the Chicagoan the other night in their eight-round bout at the Armory A. A. of Jersey City. The New Yorker carried the fighting in every round, and with an almost wanton disregard for the reputed heavy hitting ability of his opponent forged ahead consistently until at the final bell Madden was the possessor of a convincing margin of points. Brennan, essentially a long-range boxer, had absolutely no chance to display any of his cleverness. Madden was continually on top, punching away willingly at Brennan's midsection. The Chicago heavyweight did not relish this sort of mixing, but he was unable to

### present an effective defense.

Occasionally Brennan essayed to make the fighting at long range, but he showed an unexpected lack of ability. He would measure Madden for a right to the jaw, and then the Chicagoan would hesitate long enough to allow Madden to step inside his blow and smother an attack.

In the sixth session Brennan did connect with his right high on Madden's head, and with a concerted offensive the Chicagoan managed to gain the round. In every other round, however, Madden's consistency in aggressiveness and landing blows gained him the laurels.

### Likely No Big Bout.

The latest adverse action in Baltimore against the proposed heavyweight battle between Fred Fulton of Rochester, Minn., and Jack Dempsey of Salt Lake City has not entirely discouraged promoters who are eager to handle this match. One of the unofficial reports is to the effect that the promoters of New Jersey are considering the probability of bringing the match to one of the clubs in that state. The popular belief being that the contest will die a natural death as did the proposed match between Fulton and Jess Willard.

### GAVE LIFE TO SAVE OTHERS.

London, June 19.—(Correspondence of The Associated Press)—Lieutenant Harry Thorne, on duty in France, was examining hand grenades in a concrete dugout when one of them began to flash. There were twelve men in the dugout and there was no possible means of disposing of the bomb.

Lieutenant Thorne shouted to his men to clear out while he himself endeavored to smother the grenade by holding it pressed to his body. His efforts were futile and the bomb exploded, killing him.

Of the twelve other men in the dugout all two escaped without injury, and they suffered only slightly. The Albert Medal in gold has been awarded to the lieutenant's family by King George in recognition of his gallant sacrifice.

### SLAIN BY FATHER OF

Memphis, Tenn., July 4.—Robert L. Temple, a traveling salesman of Chicago, was shot and killed here within an hour of the time set for his marriage to Miss Miss Graham of Meridian, Miss., by J. R. Graham, father of the young woman, a railway conductor, surrendered after the shooting, and, according to the police, said that he was forced to kill Temple in self-defense.

The shooting occurred at the home where the young woman boarded while attending a college here as a music student. She was standing within a short distance of the men, and one of her fingers was shattered by a stray bullet.

According to a police statement, Graham declared that Temple just before the ceremony was to have taken place, admitted that he previously had been married, and that his wife still was living, and that he had not been divorced. After this admission, Graham is said to have told the police, Temple leaped toward him, and the shooting followed. Temple died within a few minutes.

A coroner's jury returned a verdict of "justifiable homicide." It was stated that Graham probably would be released on bond.
