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## THE SWORDSMEN OF THE SEA

When other kinds of fishing have grown commonplace and you want a thrilling new experience with as much dash as tiger hunting, just try sword fishing in St. Peter's Bay, Cape Breton. They are there in plenty, great big husky, fearless, scrappy, fighting fellows, some of them weighing two, three, four and five hundred pounds. Be mighty careful how you tackle these monsters for they have a reputation for doing remarkable things when hit, and many a story is told by the fishermen of stout boats that have been pierced under the water line, and of narrow escapes from disaster. They are esteemed highly as an edible fish and command a good price in the market.

The sword fish is fearless of anything that swims the sea. It has a habit of backing on the surface of the water, in stout gasoline fishing boats the fishermen approach carefully and the harpoon stands in a wire cage over the bow or side. The harpoon has a detachable head with about sixty feet of strong line attached, the other end being made fast to a cork buoy. Directly over the fish the harpoon drives the barb into his flesh, the line with buoy attached is thrown over and the gasoline boat hurriedly backs water in an earnest and sincere effort to get out of range. The fish dives furiously but soon rises as he feels the resistance of the barb. Then he looks for something to fight, and if the boat is not far enough away he goes for it. The fishermen are in most cases careful enough to get out of range, however, and after thrashing about for some time the big fish exhausts himself, and is then secured.

The sport is strenuous and it requires a strong arm and good courage to secure these furious fighters of the sea.

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Santa Catalina is famous for its tuna fishing, and the same big gamey fish frequent the waters of Cape Breton, and attain from two to three times the size, strength and speed of the California species. Any man who lands a Cape Breton tuna by the aid of a long line, a good reel, and strong rod and a steady nerve, may justly claim to belong to the real aristocracy of fishermen and will be given a high seat in the council of good sportsmen the world over, for his was a conquest gained only by much labor, skill and courage.

In describing his experience a well known fisherman, J. K. L. Ross of Montreal, who holds the world's record for landing the biggest fish, asserts as he believes that a Cape Breton tuna can be landed, when fairly hooked, two out of three times, provided that the tackle is in perfect order and that the fish is played without any mistake. He also recommends St. Ann's Bay as good fishing waters, preferably from August 30 until the end of September, when these great fish rise steadily to the bait. Incidentally be prepared for a long fight, for it requires four hours and forty-five minutes to land Mr. Ross' 680 pound tuna.
