**WHY A HORSE SNORTS**  
 Is Not a Sign of Fear, but Increases the Scat by Which the Horse Judges Objects

The person who attributes the snorting of a horse to fear, to dislike or anger, or in fact to any tense emotional state, really puts the cart before the horse and confounds cause with effect. The peculiar sound called snorting is a deep, forced breathing, without the aid of vocal chords. It is, in fact, a purely nasal sound, and it is the equivalent of the sniffing executed by human beings.

The horse belongs to that class of animals, as Dr. Theodore Zelt points out, that trust their scent rather than their vision. Just as when we wish to see a small object more plainly we examine it with a microscope, so does the horse snort in order to perceive a scent more clearly.

When we are not certain whether food is good, we sniff, because by so doing we disturb the air and enable the particles of matter to which an odor is due to reach the sensory nerves of smell, which terminate in our nostrils, more quickly and surely than if we trust the imperceptible air currents to perform this task for us.

In exactly the same way a horse snorts in order to identify any person who may be approaching. If the approaching person is one in whom the horse is not interested, it will not snort, but if it is someone whom it has reason to fear or dislike, it will snort in order to make certain whether his ancient enemy is at hand.

In this connection it is interesting to note that the African elephant is equipped with enormous ears, while his brother in India has only small ears. Both animals have small inadequate eyes, and are forced to trust to scent rather than vision in the battle of existence. The Indian elephant lives in the jungle, where odors are pungent and easily discernible, but the African elephant is a native of the plains, where the air is dry and hot and barely circulates. The heat dries the moisture out of the tiny hairs in the nostrils which connect with the sensory nerves, and it is only through flapping his enormous ears that he can create the currents of air which enable him to discern any odor.

Travelers are prone to ascribe the flapping of an elephant's ears to fury but this is a mistaken notion—Newark Star.

## HOW ASTRACHAN IS PREPARED

The big nomad tribes, the Kalmuk and Arabs, bring immense flocks of sheep each spring and autumn to the Shima market. The Russian dealers pay large sums in advance to obtain everything from the chiefs, who often deliver as many as 40,000 to 50,000 skins at one time.

Before these lambskins are ready to be packed in bales they undergo a very careful and lengthy preparation to preserve them. All have Perle in a salted state, the final tanning being done in Europe.

The preliminary cleaning of the lambskin or astrachan is done in running water, to get rid of impurities on the fleshy side of the skins, which are scraped with long, blunt-edged knives. Then follows the salting, which is done in large tanks or earthen vessels capable of holding 800 to 900 skins each. The skins remain in pickle some ten to fourteen days, and are then taken out one by one and spread on a table, where they are once more carefully examined and scraped.

This finished they are spread out in the sun to dry for twelve hours or so, by which time they are bone-dry, but very dirty, for flour, salt and water have formed a paste, and the fine hairs are all stuck together and full of lumps. To get rid of these the skins are once more washed with its quality marks and then thoroughly rinsed, well shaken, and placed woolly side down on the sun-warmed pebbles of the river-bed. Before they have time to dry hard they are sprinkled all over with a thin coating of fine barley flour.

At sunset they are taken up and handed to the classifiers. Each skin is stamped with its quality marks and then they are stacked in pairs, wool against wool, and tied round the legs with red string, after which they are ready for making up into bales—From the June Wide World.
