

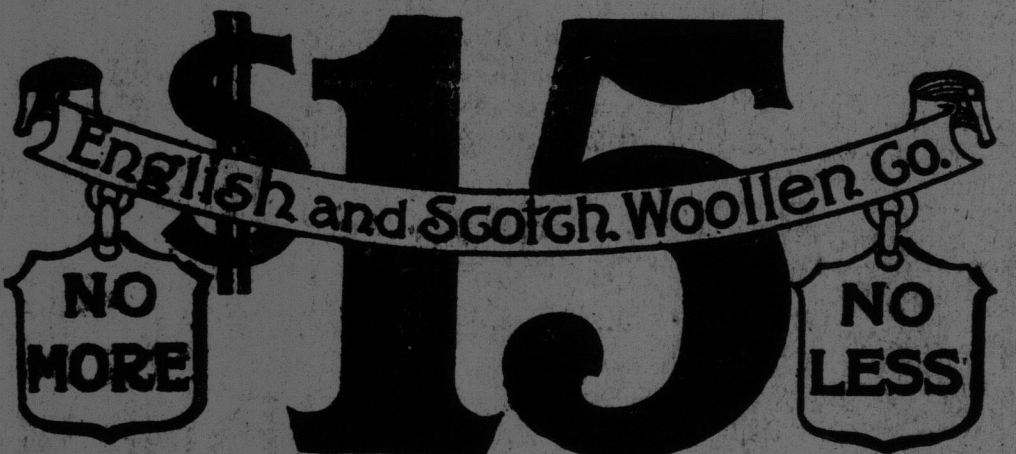

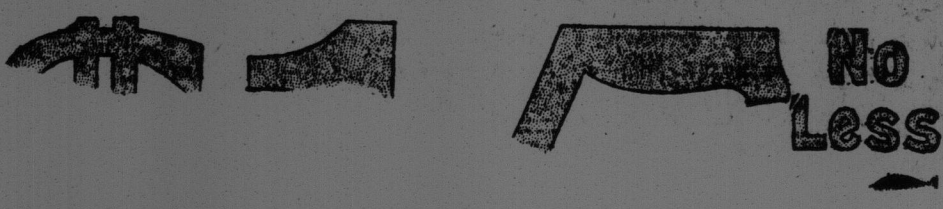

Export of Deals To Trans-Atlantic Ports

Although Shipments From Saint John Were Small During August, They Were Greater Than in the Corresponding Month Last Year

It is worthy of note that, although the exports of deals from St. John to Trans-Atlantic ports were small during the month of August, they were greater by nearly 2,500,000 feet than in August of last year. For the eight months ending August 31 the exports were only 8,700,000 sup. feet less than in the corresponding eight months last year. The totals for the period just closed were 83,715,646 sup. feet, and for the like period last year, 82,430,008 sup. feet. This relates to spruce lumber. The quantity of birch shipped was considerably larger than in the like period last year. Following is the statement:

Rev. J. A. MacKeigan, pastor of St. David's Presbyterian church, and Mrs. MacKeigan have returned to the city after thrilling adventures in Europe where they had been to spend their honeymoon. Mr. and Mrs. MacKeigan passed through Belfort, France, shortly before war was declared. They passed through Germany on their way from Constance, Switzerland to England and, while there were some demonstrations in Germany, Rev. Mr. MacKeigan and his party were treated with courtesy. They even rode in the same train with German soldiers who seemed rather reluctant at the thought of going to war. In speaking to some officers of the German army, Mr. MacKeigan learned that they blamed their government for the conflict and that they themselves were compelled to fight. MARRIED RECRUITS TO GET MORE PAY

Government to Allow Wives and Families of Those Who Enlist \$20 Monthly in Addition to the \$1.10 a Day

Ottawa, Sept. 3.—(Canadian Press)—The government has approved of a separation allowance of \$20 a month, being paid to wives and families of married men serving with the Canadian expeditionary force. This will be paid direct to the wives and families by the paymaster general's office, department of militia and defence, Ottawa. Rolls of the married men are now being prepared at Valcartier and as soon as they are received at Ottawa the work of issuing checks will begin. This allowance will also be paid to the wives and families of those left at Valcartier after the contingent sails. The government reserves the right, however, of withholding this allowance from any who are in receipt of pay from its sources. In addition, men may assign portion of their pay to their wives and families and role of this assigned pay are being prepared and as soon as received the assignments made by men to wives and families will also be direct from Ottawa.
